ABOUT THIS BOOK

OBJECTIVES:

Since it is the objectives that give meaning and direction to the lesson, the teacher must consider them carefully before going on with the preparation.

BACKGROUND:

The Background is mainly for the teacher's personal enrichment. However, sometimes it contains information or awakens dispositions necessary for the lesson. For the sake of new insights and fresh motivation, cultivate the practice of reading it carefully.

REFLECTION:

The Reflection suggested is meant to deepen the teacher's relationship with God, to renew his/her dedication to the teaching ministry and to help him/her to grow professionally.

PREPARE:

Here, the teacher's attention is drawn to what is essential to the presentation of the lesson. It must not be overlooked, especially, as the teacher might have to look for substitutes.

LESSON OUTLINE:

LOOKING AT LIFE:

By starting with what the children know from experience, the teacher prepares them for new religious knowledge and experience. Usually, LOOKING AT LIFE is only a short, preparatory step in the lesson.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

In this part of the lesson the teacher proclaims God's Word clearly from the Bible or from the Tradition of the Church.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Using various teaching techniques, the teacher unfolds the mystery of Faith or God's law of love contained in THE LIVING WORD and prepares the children to apply it in their lives. This part of the lesson should never be burried over.

FOR MY LIFE:

After having heard the Word of God, the children are encouraged to express their faith and commitment to Christ in their lives. The lesson is not finished until this has been done.

CONCLUSION:

In order to make it easier for the children to experience the presence of God in the mysteries of faith and to express their appreciation of religion through participation in the lesson, the teacher is careful to present every lesson in a pleasant and prayerful atmosphere.

FOR THE TEACHER

UNIT 1.1

I HAVE A NAME

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. experience that their names are special

b. appreciate their names

BACKGROUND:

Names are important to everyone. We honour family names and baptismal names. In Baptism, we are given our name in the Church, usually a saint's name.

The people of the Bible liked to use names that told of a person's part in the work of Salvation. The name "Jesus" means Saviour. Jesus was given this name because He was to save His people from their sins.

REFLECTION:

God knows my name.

PREPARE:

Scripture: God our Father knows our names. (Ref Is 49:14-16)


Poster: "WELCOME" (Decorate)
Name cards: for teacher and children
Tree-branch: standing firmly in a container

Song: I have a name

Story: A BABY IS BORN

Charles lived with his wife Anna in a very nice house that he built for his family. One night Anna had a little baby boy. Charles was so happy to see him enjoying his mother's milk.

Soon Charles and Anna began thinking about a name for their new baby. They thought about many names and then Charles remembered his uncle, Peter. "Let's call him Peter," he said. "Uncle Peter is such a good, kind man. Our baby will grow up like Uncle Peter." And so that's why the new baby was called Peter.

LOOKING AT LIFE

Teacher and children welcome each other.

The Welcome Poster: Children admire the welcome poster; they are happy with it.

Introductions: Each child tells his / her name. Teacher and children say:, your name is special. We like your name."

Story: "A Baby is Born"

Children see how important the baby's name is; they realize that there is a story about their own names, too.

Name cards:

Children become familiar with their names and see that each one's name is special.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD

Scripture: God knows my name. Ref Is 43:1b.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE

Children are happy that God knows their names. Their names are special to Him because He loves them very much and is always thinking of them.

Prayer: Children thank God for their special name.

Put up te Welcome poster.

Game: How many names do I know?

Children take turns in calling names of children in class.

Share stories about naming a baby.

Colour the name cards and put them on the 'naming tree.'

I RESPECT EVERYONE'S NAME

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

- a. realize that it is important to call each child his/her right name.
- respect each other's names

BACKGROUND:

In most cultures, people have special respect for names. They are not simply labels or tags such as people attach to cargo. The name is so identified with the person that it can stand for the person. To respect a person's name means to respect the person.

Right from the beginning of their history, God's people were taught to respect God's name. "Do not use my name for evil purposes," Deut 5:11a.

REFLECTION:

Do I always use God's name reverently?

PREPARE:

Scripture: My name is special to God (Ref Is 49:16)

Song: "I have a name", (Lesson 1)

Naming tree (Lesson 1)

Story: THE BOY WHO LIKES HIS NAME

One day, when the boys were playing soccer, Jimmy fell over. He was lying on the ground crying because his leg was paining. Another boy named David started to make fun of Jimmy. He called out, "Get up Skimmy." This made Jimmy cry all the more. He left the sports field and cried all the way home.

When Jimmy told his mother what had happened and how David had called him Skimmy, she put her arms around him and told him a nice story about his name.

Next day, when David saw Jimmy, he said he was sorry for calling him "that" name. He said, "Jimmy, I will never make fun of your name again." Now Jimmy was happy again!

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Naming Tree: Children recognize their names on the naming tree. They feel that their name is special.

Story: The Boy Who Likes His Name

Why did Jimmy cry? Why was David sorry?

Children realize that it is important to respect everyone's name.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD

My name is special to God. Ref Is 49:16

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE

Consider: Names are very important. God respects your name. It is good to know each other's names and to call everyone by his/her right name.

Prayer: God our Father, we are happy that you know our names. We will always respect our names.

FOR MY LIFE: Children call the names of their classmates.

Children find their names on the 'naming tree' used in Lesson

Dramatize the story.

Sing: "I have a name..."

Children pray



MY FAMILY

OBJECTIVES: Children will -

a. be able to describe their families

b. feel happy that they belong to a family

BACKGROUND:

It was God's idea that the world should be made up of families. He also decided that families should consist of parents and children.

"So God created human beings, making them to be like himself. He created them male and female, blessed them and said, "Have many children ..." Gen 1:27-28a

In describing the first family God made, the Bible speaks of parents and children. Adam and Eve were parents, Cain and Abel were their children. This idea or definition of family brings about the kind of community which is a reflection of God's own special community, the Holy Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Love binds and motivates this holy community. In the same way, our families try to be united in love and to act out of love for each other.

REFLECTION:

Do I have a strong sense of family? Am I motivated to strengthen family life in my community?

PREPARE:

Scripture: God gave us families. (Ref BACKGROUND)

Picture: A Family

Song: God the Father (2x) is loving me,

Father, mother, (2x) He gives to me.

Brother, sister, (2x).....

Story: MICHAEL'S FAMILY

Michael is in Prep. He has two sisters and two brothers. Michael is still quite a small boy and so he likes being with his parents and brothers and sisters.

Michael's parents love their children and look after them very well. The children help their parents to clean the garden and to sweep around the house. When all the work is finished, they sit together to rest and tell stories



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children share their experience of family life. Name the members of their family.

What does your mother do for her family?

What does your father do for his family?

How do the children in your family help each other?

Picture: Family life

What does this picture show you?

Children understand that living together and helping each other makes a family happy.

Story: Michael's Family

Why is Michael a happy boy? (He is loved and well looked after in his family.)

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD

God gave us families. (Ref Gen 1:27-28a)

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Who gave you your family?

Consider: God gave you your family. He knows and loves your family. He wants you to be happy in your family and to love everyone in your family.

Prayer: Thank you God for my family.

Song: God the Father

MY MOTHER LOVES ME

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. come to realize that their mothers love them

b. want to show love for their mothers

BACKGROUND:

Before sending His Son into the world, God chose a mother for Him, Mary of Nazareth. Jesus was to grow up in a family and experience a mother's love. Mary nursed Jesus and cared for Him perfectly; she did everything that mothers do for their children. He was grateful to His mother and loved her in return.

Jesus wanted to share His beautiful mother with all those who were to become His brothers and sisters. In the last moments of His life, Jesus gave Mary to us to be our own dear Mother and the Mother of the whole Church. "She is your mother," Jn 19:27.

REFLECTION: Reflect on Mary's words: "Do whatever He tells you". Jn 2:5

PREPARE:

Scripture: God knows my mother. He knows how much my mother loves

me. Ref ls 49:15a.


Pictures: Family poster

Perhaps I'll be able to go with you another time, when I'm not so busy."

Consider: God knows your mothers. He made them so that they would love you. He sees everything that they do for you and He is very pleased with them.

Song: God Father, you love me so.

Children appreciate that their mothers do many things for them because they love them.

Prayer: Children ask God to bless their mothers.

Children draw their mothers washing / cooking etc.

Picture: A mother doing something for her children.

Children name things that mothers do for their children.

Each child says: My mother loves me: She for me.

Sing with actions.

Teacher leads the prayer.

FOR MY LIFE: After school, I will go home and help my mother.

MY MOTHER HELPS ME WHEN I'M SICK

OBJECTIVES: Children will -

a. realize that their mothers take special care of them when they are sick

b. be thankful to their mothers

BACKGROUND:

A compassionate person shares in the suffering of others and has a strong desire to lessen it, to take it away altogether. Compassion is a beautiful gift that God gives people, especially mothers. Being hard-hearted is the opposite of being compassionate.

In the story of the suffering and death of Jesus, it is His mother and the holy women who stay with Him right to the end. They had great compassion for Him.

REFLECTION:

What do I remember about my mother? Is there something I should do for her now?

PREPARE:

Picture: A mother caring for her sick child

Card: A card for each child, with "MOTHER" on it. Song: God Father you love me so.. page 8

Story: THE SICK CHILDREN

One day I visited a very big hospital. When I came up to the verandah, I saw lots of mothers sitting there holding sick children. Some of the children were crying and their mothers were rubbing their heads. Some mothers had bottles of water and biscuits for their children. Some mothers were waiting and waiting because there were many sick children needing medicine. They were very sorry for their sick children.

When I went inside, I saw many mothers sitting beside their children. They had been there all night. In the morning, they washed them and put powder on them and gave them food. Then they sat beside them again and waited for the nurse to come along.

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children remember times when they were sick and needed special help. What did your mother do for you?

Picture: Family picture

How do mothers feel when their children are sick? Why do they stay with them? (to try to take away their pain.)

Story: Sick Children

Who stayed with the sick children?
Was it easy for the mothers to stay at the hospital?

Children understand that mothers give sick children special love and care.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE

Who made our mothers "special"?
What is very special about your mothers?
When do your mothers take special care of you?

Consider: God was very good to give you your mother. She loves you and cares for you always and especially when you are sick.

Prayer: Children thank God for giving them their mothers.

Draw your mother


Cards: Children go over the word **MOTHER** and colour it in.

When Jesus came, He taught everyone to think of God as "Father". During his lifetime, Jesus often called God His Father. His last prayer on the cross was, "Father, into your hands I place my spirit!" Lk 23:46.

REFLECTION:

Do I think of God as "My Father"? Do I love and trust Him?

PREPARE:

Flashcard: God gave me my father.

Pictures: Family pirture, page 244

Song: As for lesson 4. Change to "Father"

Story: PATRICK AND HIS FATHER

Patrick lives near the sea. His father often takes him out fishing. He loves going out in the deep, deep sea with his father. One day when they were out in the deep water, they saw children playing in little canoes their fathers had made for them. Patrick said, "Papa, I'd love to have a canoe so that I could play with the others when you're away at work."

So Patrick's father cut down a tree and made a fine canoe. When Patrick came home from school and saw the canoe tied to a tree on the beach, he was so happy. He said, "O Papa, you are so good to me!"

BACKGROUND:

Mothers and fathers have different gifts from God and from nature, and so they parent in different ways. Mothers are fitted for caring and comforting children while fathers tend to stimulate, extend and discipline them. Some studies show that fathers have a special role in building children's self-respect. As children pass through different stages of development, demands on mothers and fathers shift back and forward. This means that **both** parents need to be actively involved in rearing children.

REFLECTION:

Do I pray for my father? Does he need my help now?

PREPARE:

Picture: Family picture page 244

Song: I have a house, a very fine house.

Its walls and roof are strong.



These qualities are generally well-taught by brothers and sisters who persevere steadily in their efforts until they achieve a fair measure of success. The ability to live happily and peacefully with others grows out of these qualities. If our brothers and sisters managed to teach us to share and to accept others, then we have a life-long debt to them.

REFLECTION:

What have I learned from my brothers and sisters about sharing and accepting others?

PREPARE:

Picture: Family picture

Song:

God has made us a family, and together we will grow in love


Story: THE TIA FAMILY

Have you ever heard of the Tia family? The four little Tias... Mark and Joe, Mary and Lucy live with their Mum and Dad in a big house right beside a very big river. Every morning the four little Tias walk along a bush track together on their way to school. Mark carries all the lunches and Joe helps his little sisters with their school bags.

At lunch time they sit together and share their lunch. Some children say, "Those Tias

are always together!"

When school is over, the four little Tias wait for each other and go home together. They talk nicely together on the way home and then help each other with their little jobs. On Sundays, they all put on their best clothes and go off together to Mass. Their parents are so happy to see them sharing everything. They say, "Our children love each other very much!

Children pray

FOR MY LIFE: Before I sleep I will say Good Night to my brothers and sisters.



GOD HELPS MY PARENTS

OBJECTIVES: Children will -

a. become aware that God helps their parents to look after them

b. be happy that they are loved and cared for

BACKGROUND:

After having made our First Parents "like himself," God blessed them and said, "Have many children, so that your descendants will live all over the earth and bring it under their control," Gen 1:28. This is how God honoured our First Parents and guaranteed them His help. He wants human beings to become fully mature through responsible parenthood and action in the world.

REFLECTION:

God acts at a very deep level in family life. He gives the gift of life through parents and helps them to bring up their children.

PREPARE:

Scripture: God blesses parents (Ref Gen 1:28)

Prayer: God, thank you for my parents. Please bless them and help them to look after us.


Children draw themselves dressed and ready for school.

OBJECTIVES: Children will -

a. become aware that families go to Mass on Sundays

b. feel that they want to go to Mass with their family

BACKGROUND:

Sunday is a day of celebration. It is a holy day, a day with a difference. Every Sunday is a memorial of Easter Sunday when Christ rose from the dead.

In Old Testament times, God's people were instructed to set aside the seventh day of each week as the day on which they remembered God's kindness to them in saving them from Egypt. Now, in New Testament times, God's people set aside the first day of each week as the day on which they remember Salvation. "Very early on Sunday morning ..." The four evangelists record that the Resurrection of Christ took place on Sunday and that is why Sunday is our holy day. The Church asks us to celebrate Sunday by going to Mass.

REFLECTION:

How do I celebrate Sundays?

PREPARE:

Cards: Trace SUNDAY on each card

Poster: A decorated poster with the words:

SUNDAY is a special day.



Poster: Children admire the decorated poster; they understand that Sunday is special.

Consider: God wants families to go to Mass together on Sundays.

Song: This is the day...

Play: Ringing the Mass Bell. or beating the garamut. Say: Sunday today."


Children draw themselves going to Mass with their families.

REFLECTION:

Through my profession, I share in a special way in the teaching mission of Jesus.

PREPARE:

Poster: The name of a local village and the words,

Card: A small card for each child with the name of his / her village (town) printed

lightly on it.

Song: We are happy children of God, children of God.


Story: MATTHEW'S VILLAGE

Matthew's village is near a lovely clean river and it has a big sports field where Matthew and his friends play. The village houses are close together and so everyone feels safe. The gardens are back a little in the bush. Everyday, the people go to the gardens with their bush knives and spades. Often, you can hear them singing and laughing as they go.

When their work is finished, they go and wash in the river. What a happy time

everyone has there playing and splashing in the water!



The Commandments set their life-style and prepared them for worship. The rules for worship were given to strengthen their faith and to help them to be reverent during worship.

For more than 500 years, God's people had no special house in which to worship God. It was only in the time of King Solomon, 970-931 B.C. that a proper Temple was built. The story of the Building and Dedication of this Temple is in the O.T., 1 Kgs Chapters 5, 6 and 8.

REFLECTION:

"Can you, O God, really live on earth? Not even all of heaven is large enough to hold you, so how can this Temple that I have built be large enough?" 1 Kg 8:27.



I MAKE THE SIGN OF THE CROSS

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. be able to make the Sign of the Cross

b. enjoy making the Sign of the Cross carefully

BACKGROUND:

The Sign of the Cross is extremely rich in meaning because it brings together the two great mysteries of our faith. When we make the Sign of the Cross, we express our faith in the mystery of the Holy Trinity, God Father, Son and Holy Spirit and in the mystery of the Redemption.

From the earliest times, the Church has venerated the Cross. In the second part of the Good Friday Liturgy, the Church invites everyone to venerate the Cross.

"We worship you, Lord,
we venerate your cross,
we praise your resurrection.
Through the cross you brought joy to the world."

It is quite difficult for small children to make the Sign of the Cross. They have to know that it is a religious sign; they have to be able to remember and co-ordinate words and actions. Teachers know how to take time and to persevere with practice until the children can make the Sign of the Cross confidently and reverently.

REFLECTION:

How and when do I make the Sign of the Cross?

PREPARE:

Poster: A cross and the words:

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Drawing: A Church with a Cross on it.



The wonderful gift of speech is meant to be used for praising and thanking God and for helping our brothers and sisters. "Do not use harmful words, but only helpful words, the kind that build up and provide what is needed, so that what you say will do good to those who hear you." Eph 4:29.

PREPARE:

Picture: A Family, page 33

Story: SARA AND HER CHILDREN

I am going to tell you a story about a mother named Sara and her children. One very hot day Sara sat down under a shady tree with her children around her. They were talking to her; they were telling her about a game they liked very much. Sara looked happy sitting there with her children talking to her. At last she said, "Thank you for telling me your nice stories. I'm always happy to hear your stories." Then one of the children said, "Mama, we like you to tell us stories, too."

OUTLINE LESSON 16

LOOKING AT LIFE:

The children are invited to name who they talk to. Who do you like to talk to?

They realize that it is nice to talk to people.



I AM HAPPY THAT I CAN TALK

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. realize that they make people happy (or sad) when they talk

b. try to say good words always

BACKGROUND:

The Apostles gave very definite instructions to the early Christians about how they should use the gift of speech. In Baptism, they received the gift of the Holy Spirit; they became God's dwelling place. They were to remember this always and not embarrass the Holy Spirit with rough and vulgar language.

REFLECTION:

"Do not use harmful words, but only helpful words, the kind that build up and provide what is needed, so that what you say will do good to those who hear you." Eph 4:29

PREPARE:

Scripture: Use words that make people happy. Ref. Eph 4:29

Story: MR. OKAY

Mr. Okay lives in a village in the Highlands and everyone likes him very much. Of course, Okay isn't his real name. But everyone calls him by that name. You see, when he was a small boy, he'd always say O.K. whenever his mother or father asked him to do something. It was the same at school! Whenever the teacher had a little job for him, he'd say O.K. and off he'd go and do it. Soon, all the children knew what a nice boy he was and they loved to hear him say O.K. whenever people asked him to do something. Even today, when the village people need help, they go to Mr. Okay because they know he always says "O.K., I'll help you."

Story: A WALK IN THE VILLAGE

Last week, I went for a walk to a village. When I reached it, I sat down on a big stone and started talking to the people who came by. While I was sitting there, I heard a mother calling her child. But, when I heard the little girl's answer, I felt very sad. She spoke so roughly to her mother, "I'm not going to get water for you. Get it yourself. Have you got a broken leg?"

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Can you remember a time when someone said something that made you happy? Can you remember a time when someone said something that made you feel sad?

Children realize that they can feel happy or sad by what people say to them.

Story: Mr. Okay

How did Mr. Okay make everyone happy?

Children realize that everyone liked Mr. Okay because he made them happy when he said "O.K."

Story: A Walk in the Village

What did the little girl say to her mother?

Children realize that there are 'bad' words in this story. The little girl's words made her mother very sad.

'Good and bad words

Children widen their understanding of good and bad words. They realize that they should use good words.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD

Scripture: Use words that will make people happy.

Ref. Eph 4:29.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE

Consider: God made you so that you can talk. He wants you to make everyone happy by what you say. Some words make others happy and some make them sad. Try to use good words always.

Play: Mr. Okay

Draw happy faces and sad faces:

Teacher: Make a list on the b'board: Good words. Children say these words.

Teacher and children thank God they can talk; promise to say good words.

FOR MY LIFE:

"Thank you" is a good word. I will say "thank you" whenever someone helps me.

I CAN DO MANY THINGS WITH MY MOUTH

OBJECTIVES: Children will -

a. become aware that their mouth is a gift from God

b. be thankful to God for their mouth

BACKGROUND:

The Old Testament tells us that the mouth is to be used for praising God. The Psalmist wanted to do this holy work well and so he prayed: "Lord, place a guard at my mouth, a watchman at the door of my lips." Ps 141:3 Because of their special dignity, the early Christians were taught to use their mouths to speak about what God did for them in calling them into new life and to praise Him. They were often warned against using bad language, telling lies and talking about others. In the Letter of St. James there is a long passage about The Tongue. Ref. James 3:1-12.

REFLECTION:

Would "a watchman at the door of my lips" be very busy?

PREPARE:

Scripture: We use our mouths to pray. Ref. Ps 141:3

Food: For the children to eat. (fruit..)


Song:



Imagine a feast without the smell of scented leaves! Anything with a pleasant smell attracts our attention and gets our instant approval. The smell of Noah's sacrifice pleased the Lord and that is why He promised that He would never again destroy all living beings. Ref Gen 8:20f

REFLECTION:

Have I ever thanked God for the gift of smell?

PREPARE:

Samples: Cooked food, scented flowers and leaves

Poster: Children smelling a flower

Thank you God for giving me a nose (3x)

Right out in front!

Story: A BOY CALLED JAMES

James was only five years old when his father said, "James, I'd like to take you to the bush, tomorrow." - b. be happy that they can see, hear etc

BACKGROUND:

Some people say that everything in our minds enters through our senses and they compare our senses to doors. Besides allowing traffic to pass through, doors are also important as points of control. If our senses are like doors, then it would be wise to control what passes into our minds through them.

Sometimes the Bible speaks about God as though He, too, has five senses. It says that God sees and hears; that He smells and touches things. God <u>saw</u> Hagar running away from her mistress, Gen 16:8; He <u>heard</u> the baby Ishmael crying under a bush, Gen 21:17. He <u>smelt</u> the smoke of Noah's offering, Gen 8:21. His <u>touch</u> changed many things.

REFLECTION:

Do I control what passes into my mind through my senses?

PREPARE:

Scripture: (based on Gen 1:26-27)

When God made the world and saw how beautiful it was, He wanted to share it. So He made a man and a woman and gave them very special gifts.

God gave the man and the woman eyes to see and ears to hear and a mouth to taste. He gave them a nose to smell and hands to feel and to help.

God was pleased that He made the man and the woman. He thought, 'They have many gifts; they will be able to learn many things.'



REFLECTION:

PREPARE:

Picture: Two children. Page 49

Story: I'M SOLAI

My special name is Solai. I have two very bright shining eyes and two good ears and a mouth that laughs and talks. I have strong hands to help at home and at school. And many, many people like me, especially my mother and fat

Uncle Joe and Aunt Millie come to see me and bring me mangoes and peanuts. I'm so lucky! Grandpa often calls me to sit beside him and tell him stories... and I know he likes me very much.

When I come to school, my teacher smiles at me and says, "Good morning, Solai" and my school friends like playing with me. It's the same when I go to Mass. Our priest smiles at me and calls me "Solai". He makes me feel good. I'm happy because so many people like me! And, of course, God my Father likes me, too!

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children name people who help them, for example their mother / father / grandpa / teacher.

Song: We are one big happy family, page 53



FOR MY LIFE: I will try to make new friends at school.



Good motivation grows out of faith and bears fruit through self-discipline and self-sacrifice.

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Children **pray**: God my Father, every time, I...... **Response:** I will do my work to please You.





God calls the whole human family into eternal life. He wills eternal happiness for everyone. He does not promise freedom from suffering in this life, but gives us the great promise: "I will be with you." Ex 3:12a

REFLECTION:

The shadow of the Cross falls across everyone's path challenging each one to find meaning in it as Jesus did.

PREPARE:

Drawing: A sad-looking person

Story: SOLAI SHARES A SAD STORY

One Saturday afternoon some big children came to our house. They stood in a little group talking quietly to my big brother and sister. Sometimes they'd look around to see where I was. Then one of them said, "Solai, please go and get us the spade." I ran off and got it and when I came back with it... everyone was gone!

This made me very sad. They didn't want me. I went and told Mama how they tricked me. She knew how sad I was and spoke so nicely to me. She said, "They shouldn't have tricked you like that, but never mind, put up with it for the love of God."

After that, I went and sat on the doorstep all by myself. I couldn't do anything. But, somehow, I remembered how nicely Mama said: "Put up with it for the love of God."

Story: JOSEPH AND HIS BROTHERS Ref Gen 37

Long ago, there lived a good boy named Joseph. God liked him and was always with him. Joseph had many brothers, but he was sad because they didn't like him. They'd never let Joseph go anywhere with them. They used to say among themselves: "Leave him. We don't want him. If we do anything, he'll tell on us and Papa will be cross." Joseph's father liked him very much and was sorry to see him so sad because of the way his brothers treated him.

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Can you remember a time when you felt sad? What made you sad? What did you do when you were sad? Who helped you to feel happy again?

They realize that no-one likes to feel sad.

Story: Solai Shares a Sad Story

Children enter into Solai's feelings of sadness. What made Solai sad? How could you see that Solai was sad? How did Solai's mother help him?

Drawing: A sad-looking person How does this person look?

Children realize that everyone knows what it is like to feel sad.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Story: Joseph and His Brothers, Ref Gen 37

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Why was Joseph sad? Who felt sorry for Joseph? Who was with him all the time?

Consider: God knew that Joseph was sad and He stayed with him to help him. God knows when you are feeling sad, too. He is with you and helps you.

Prayer: God our Father, when we are sad, please help us.

FOR MY LIFE: When my friend is sad, I will stay with him / her.

Draw yourself with a sad face.

Dramatize the story.

Children retell the story.

Teacher leads the prayer

I DON'T LIKE TO FEEL AFRAID

OBJECTIVES: Children will -

a. become aware of the experience of fear

b. will feel that God is near

BACKGROUND:

Fear is an unpleasant feeling. It comes on spontaneously when we believe that danger or pain or death is near. Like every human emotion, fear can be controlled.

Often we are afraid of others. We are afraid that they might destroy our property, break up our friendships, mislead us, spoil our name or even our lives. These are all the things that God's commandments protect! By respecting God's commandments, we bring peace into our communities.

REFLECTION:

"Perfect love drives out all fear," 1 Jn 4,18a.

PREPARE:

Story: SOLAI SHARES A SECRET

Today, I am going to tell you a secret about myself. I'm not going to speak loudly because it's a secret.

One day when I went home from school, there was no one at home. When I came near our house, I saw that the kitchen door was locked ... and I knew that Mama was not home!

I didn't know what to do. I was all by myself. I looked at the padlock on the door. Then, suddenly I dropped my bag on the ground and fell down on the little heap of stones beside our house ... and cried. Well, that's my secret. I'm afraid when I'm by myself.

Story: THE STORY OF JOSEPH (continued) Ref Gen 37

One day, Joseph's brothers tied him up and threw him into a deep, dark hole. Poor Joseph! He was all by himself in that hole; he thought he would die there and never see his father again. But God was looking after Joseph. God knew that he was in that hole and He saved him. Joseph didn't die and, one day, he saw his father again! Now they knew that God had been with them all the time.

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children share their experience of fear.
Why don't you walk about in the dark?
How do you feel in a big storm / earthquake?

Children realize that they often feel afraid.

Story: Solai Shares His Secret

Children feel sorry for Solai and understand how he feels.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Story: The Story of Joseph, Gen 37

Children share Joseph's fear and are happy that God helped him.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

How did Joseph feel? Who was with Joseph? Who kept Joseph safe?

Consider: God does not want you to feel afraid. He is with you always and will always look after you.

Prayer: Let us ask God to look after us. Say,


The Lord be with you. And also with you.

FOR MY LIFE: When I am afraid, I will make the Sign of the Cross.

Draw Solai looking at the padlock on the kitchen door. Retell the story.

OBJECTIVES: Children will -

a. experience the joy of surprise

b. feel that God is very near to them

BACKGROUND:

Jesus taught his followers to be wise and to plan their lives and not leave important things to chance. But we cannot plan on the graces God will give us. These will always come as surprises. They bring us joy and help us on our journey home to heaven.

REFLECTION:

"Your Father knows what you need before you ask," Mt 6,8.

PREPARE:

Plan a surprise for your class

Story: SOLAI SHARES HIS SUPRRISE

It was a very hot afternoon and I was working in the garden with Papa and Mama. I was so tired. My back was paining and my arms were paining. I was wishing they would finish and go home. But they kept on working, working, cleaning our garden.

As I stood up to straighten my back, I turned around ... and there was a beautiful white cockatoo walking down the middle of our garden. It came right up to where we were working and I think it was trying to say something!

We stood looking at it for a long time ... and it stood quite still while I ran up and caught it. "What a beautiful surprise!" said Mama. "Let's go home and share our surprise with everyone!"

Scripture: (1 Kgs 19:3-8, as told below)

God had a very special friend called Elijah, but some people didn't like him. One day, he heard that someone wanted to kill him so he decided to run away.

After some days, his food and his water were finished and his legs were paining. He sat down under a tree and went off to sleep. After a while he heard someone say, "Wake up and eat." Elijah woke up and what do you think he saw? a big loaf of bread and a bottle of cold water right beside him! And that was Elijah's suprise!

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children experience the surprise the teacher planned for them.

How did the surprise make you feel?

Children wonder about surprises. Why do they happen?

Story: Solai Shares His Surprise

What was the surprise? Did someone plan it? How did it help Solai?

Children enter into the joy of surprise. They notice that it just happened and that it helped Solai.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: Elijah on Mount Sinai, Ref 1 Kgs 19:3-8. Elijah's Surprise ... as told above.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

How did God make Elijah happy?

Consider: Even though surprises just seem to happen, we can thank God for them because they make us happy and help us.

Prayer: God our Father, we thank you for all the nice surprises we have had. Help us to be your good children always

Draw Solai holding his cockatoo.

Draw Elijah when he woke up.

Teacher and children pray

FOR MY LIFE: I will plan a surprise for my family.

FOR THE TEACHER

UNIT 4:32

I AM GOD'S CHILD

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. know that they are God's children

b. be happy to learn to grow up as good children of God

BACKGROUND:

The Sacrament of Baptism makes us children of God and members of the Catholic Church. In Baptism, we receive the gift of the Holy Spirit and the gift of eternal life. We respond to the grace of Baptism by living in union with Christ.

At Easter time, Catholics renew their baptismal promises. They realize that through Baptism, they share in the Risen Life of Christ. They realize that they must try to be "like Christ" in their daily lives and not spoil their Baptism by separating themselves from Him.

REFLECTION:

"Those who live as the Spirit tells them to, have their minds controlled by what the Spirit wants." Ro 8:5b

PREPARE:

Scripture: We are God's children. Ref 1 Jn 3:1

Story: A NEW BABY GETS HER NAME

William lives in a village right up in the Highlands. He has a very big garden and works hard to grow food for his family.

One night William's wife had a new baby. In the morning all the children gathered around to look at their new baby sister. She looked lovely sleeping in her mother's arms.

Soon all the children started asking about a name for their little sister. William said, "She is a beautiful baby! She must have a beautiful name!" The children called many names, but William thought that they were not pretty enough. At last their mother said, "Let's call her Carmel-Anne!" And that was the name she was called, when her family brought her to the church to be baptized.

LOOKING AT LIFE:

CARLEN MARINE.

Children share: How we get ready to welcome a new baby into our family.

They realize that new babies are very important and that there are many things to do for a new baby.

Story: A New Baby Gets Her Name

Children appreciate that it was very important to bring Carmel-Anne to the Church (God's house) and to give her a special name in God's family.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Picture: A Child being Baptized

Children understand that when a baby is baptized it belongs to God. God is its Father; He knows it and takes care of it and wants it to be His happy child.

Scripture: We are God's children. (Ref 1 Jn 3:1)

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Have they ever seen a baby being baptised? (Who was there? What name was the baby given? etc)

Children understand that Baptism is very important; that it is very important to be God's child.

Consider: God knows you and cares for you. He knows your name. He calls you His child and He wants you to know that He is your Father.

Prayer: Let us thank God for making us His children: God my Father, I am happy that I am your child. Please look after me and help me to be a good child.

Consider: You are God's child. He wants you to be an obedient child.

Prayer: Make the Sign of the Cross. Pray: God, my Father, I am God's child. I will be obedient at home and at school.

Song: We are one big happy family

FOR MY LIFE: I will obey my parents and teachers

Do I look after my own things and everything that is given to me for my use?




Scripture: God wants us to look after our things. (Ref Ex 20:15,17)
Chalkboard Sketches: Things children use e.g. balls, books, shoes, bags etc

Story: THE LOST BALL

One day, Michael's father and mother went to town to buy clothes for all their children. In one of the stores, Michael's mother saw a big red ball hanging in a net. "Our children would like that ball," she said. Michael's Dad opened his pouch and took out the money to pay for it. And that is how the children got their ball!

One day, when Michael was playing with some other children, he got cross and kicked the ball as far as he could. "Leave it!" he said... Oh, sorry! When he went back next day, the ball was gone!





LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children name things that belong to them.

Who gave you these things? Where do you keep them? How do you look after them?

Children realize that they have many things to use and to look after.

Blackboard Sketches:

Children recognize things that they own and use. They describe how they look after them.

Story: The Lost Ball Why did the ball get lost? How did Michael's parents feel?

Children understand that Michael did not look after his ball. He made his mother and father sad.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD

Scripture: God wants us to look after our things. Ref Ex 20:15, 17.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Why do we look after our things?

Consider: You need many things at home and at school. Your parents buy the things you need. You should look after your own things and never spoil other children's things. God wants you to look after your things at home and at school.

Prayer: God our Father, we are happy that we have things for home and for school. Help us to look after them well.

Children draw something that belongs to them.

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Draw the ball hanging on its nail,

Game: "I am touching (e.g. a book) and it belongs to ...

Teacher and children pray.

FOR MY LIFE:

Children tidy their things remembering that God wants them to look after their things.

I PLAY PROPERLY

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. become aware that selfishness spoils happiness

b. want to make others happy at play

BACKGROUND:

St Peter expected Christians to be uncomplaining and to give-in to each other.

Two letters from St Peter have been kept for us in the New Testament. They are both rather short and quite easy to read.

The sufferings of Jesus were always fresh in St Peter's mind. Because of this, he considered the pains and hardships of life to be small things that pass quickly; they can be accepted because of the joys of Heaven.

REFLECTION:

Do I work well with others in my family / on the staff? Do I give-in to others for the sake of peace?


PREPARE:

Scripture: Give in to each other. Ref 1 Pt 1:13f

Story: LAZY JAGI

Jagi is a bit fat and a bit lazy. At play-time, when the children take the ball out to play, lazy Jagi always grabs it and sits on it. And that's the end of the game!

Sometimes the children want to have races. Lazy Jagi sits down at the starting-line fixing his shoes or doing something else, while everyone waits and waits ... and the bell rings again before the game really starts! Jagi is just the same in school. Sometimes there are nice games in the lessons, but lazy Jagi always spoils them. At colouring-in time, Jagi hides the red crayons; when there are guessing games, Jagi goes on strike. It is always the same old story ... Jagi never plays properly with anyone.



LOOKING AT LIFE

Can you remember a time when someone spoiled a game? What happened?
How did you feel?

Children realize that they are happy when everyone plays properly.

Story: Lazy Jagi

Why did Jagi spoil the game? ... the races?

Children realize that Jagi spoils happiness because he is selfish.

Children understand that they make each other happy by playing properly together.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: Give in to each other. Ref 1 Pt 1:13f

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

How can we make other children happy?

Consider: God our Father likes us to play properly; He likes us to make others happy when we play. He likes us to be unselfish.

Sing: We are one big happy family

Prayer: Children thank God for all the happy times they have had playing together. Tell Him that they will try to make others happy whenever they play together.

FOR MY LIFE: I will make others happy when I play.

Dramatize or draw: Jagi spoils a game.

Make or draw happy faces and cross faces.

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Sing with actions.

Children make their own prayers.



I SPEAK NICELY TO OTHERS

OBJECTIVES: Children will -

a. realize the importance of speaking nicely

b. speak nicely to others because God wants them to

BACKGROUND:

The gift of speech is one of the many wonderful gifts given by God to human beings. It is one of those special gifts that make us "like God". It sets us above the rest of creation; it makes us "a little less than the angels," Ps 8:5. Through this gift, we are able to express our thoughts and our feelings; we are able to live socially and enrich ourselves and others through communication. We are able to praise God in prayer and song.

In the Letters kept for us in the New Testament, there are many references to the proper use of our gift of speech. "Do not use harmful words, but only helpful words, the kind that build up and provide what is needed, so that what you say will do good to those who hear you... No more shouting or insults ... nor is it fitting for you to use language which is obscene, profane, or vulgar. Rather you should give thanks to God.... Speak to one another with the words of psalms, hymns and sacred songs; sing hymns and psalms to the Lord with praise in your hearts." Ref Eph 4 & 5.

Teachers pay attention to the way children speak to each other and lead them to appreciate their gift of speech.

REFLECTION:

Do I use my gift of speech in a Christian way?

PREPARE:

Scripture: God wants us to speak nicely to each other.

Ref Eph 4 & 5

Flash cards: Thank you. Please. Good morning. I'll help you. (any

other helpful words)



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children sit down in twos or in small groups in a pleasant place and talk about what they did last night / what they learned in school or tell a story etc.

They experience the pleasure of talking to each other.

Where have you seen people talking together?

The children become more aware of their own good gift.

Name times when you talk to your friends.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: God wants us to speak nicely to each other. Ref Eph 4 & 5.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Flash cards:

Children become familiar with the kind of words that help others. They learn to say them in a pleasant way.

Who knows some more helpful words?

Consider: God has given you the gift of speech. He wants you to speak nicely to each other. He wants you to use helpful words and not to use rough words.

Prayer: Let us ask God to help us to speak nicely to others.

Children draw themselves talking to a friend.

Display the flash cards.
Children repeat the words.

Children make their own prayers.

FOR MY LIFE: I will say "please" when I ask for something.

I SHARE IN MY FAMILY'S WORK

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. become aware that sharing in family work makes family life happy

b. want to share because sharing pleases God

BACKGROUND:

In every family different age groups and generations live together.

The old and the young help each other to grow wiser and more tolerant.

In their families, people learn to respect other people's rights; they learn 'the give-and-take' of social life and its responsibilities. The family is well-recognized as being the foundation of society. (Ref The Church in the Modern World, par 52)

REFLECTION:

"Do not forget to do good and help one another because these are the sacrifices that please God," Heb 13,16

PREPARE:

Scripture: Do not forget to share with one another.

Ref Heb 13,16

Song: I will get the firewood

(Tune: Mulberry bush) Music page 56

Story: A VISIT

One day Christine asked her friend, Alice to visit her house. She said, "You can have a rest at my house and have some food, too."

As Alice came along with Christine, she saw Christine's Papa cutting firewood. He was whistling while he worked and Mama was preparing food. Her big brother, Leo was feeding the chickens and her sister, Susan was minding the baby. Teresa, another sister, was sweeping around the kitchen and her small brother, Michael was watering the garden. Everyone was busy sharing the little jobs that had to be done before night came on.

Children become aware that sharing the work makes families happy.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: Do not forget to help one another. Ref Heb 13,16.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Consider: God tells us that happiness comes when we help / share the family work.

How do you help in your family?

Song: I will get the firewood, firewood, firewood, I will get the firewood, I want to help my mother. I will mind the baby
I will get the water.... cont.

Prayer: Let us ask God to help us to share in the work of our families

I LEARN TO SHARE WITH OTHERS

BACKGROUND:

For the early Christians, sharing their things was an important way of showing their love for each other. Sharing was a feature of their communities. "All the believers continued together in close fellowship and shared their belongings with one another. They would sell their property and possessions and distribute the money among all, according to what each one needed" Acts 2:44-45.

REFLECTION:

What is my attitude to sharing? Do I make excuses for not sharing?

PREPARE:

Scripture: God's people shared their things. Ref Acts 2:44-45

Song: We are one big happy family, page 53

STORY: THE LUNCH

Mary was sitting all by herself behind the tank. She was so upset; she was crying to herself and wiping her tears away with her dress. Suddenly Alice came around the corner and saw her there. "What's wrong? What's making you so sad?" she asked.

At last, Mary was able to tell the little story about her lunch. Her mother had prepared such nice lunch for her that morning. Mary carried it to school very carefully and put it up on a branch of the big tree, right near the bell. She thought it would be quite safe.... and went to class.

At play-time, Mary was feeling hungry and went to get a scone. The lunch was gone! There was not a scrap left! A skinny, old dog had stolen it and run away with it.

Alice was so sorry for Mary. She knew how hungry and disappointed she was, so she ran off and got her lunch. "Let's share mine. It will do the both of us!" Mary stopped crying. She was happy sitting beside Alice sharing her lunch.

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children name things they share at home / at school.

They realize that sharing makes them and others happy.

Story: The Lunch

Tell the story **stressing** that Alice made Mary happy through sharing her lunch.

How did Alice make Mary happy?

Children understand that sharing is a way of making others happy.

Have you seen people sharing things? What were they sharing?

Children discover that people share all kinds of things and that sharing brings happiness.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

What do you think God's people might have shared?.

Consider: God wants you to share your things because you make others happy when you share.

In fact, teamwork is a special feature of modern life. Worldwide, people are looking for fellowship and feeling responsibility for the world and for the development of people.

Christian teachers, with their faith and their special vocation, have unique opportunities for tuning children into these good aspects of our times

How can I carry out my Christian duty of building a better world?

PREPARE:



When the bell rings for community work, no one turns up for work and when the bell rings for community celebrations, only a few children come. We never have happy times, now.

Sometimes one of us gets sick, but no one helps the sick person to go to hospital. One person says to the other: 'You go. I'm too busy. I need my truck.' That's what my village is like! It's a very sad place!





Leo wants to be with the community to meet God. He wants to give his gift to God and share in the prayers and songs.

Children understand that old people and young people and children all go to church together.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: God wants us to share with others in our church-community. Ref Ac2:43f.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Who do you meet at church?

Consider: God likes to meet you in the church with your community. He likes you to pray and sing and offer your gifts together with others.

Song: A song used at Mass

Children understand what it means to share with others in their church.

FOR MY LIFE: I will pray and sing with others in the church.

Children draw themselves helping to prepare the church for Mass.

Children draw the church-bell or garamut.

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Retell the story, Leo Goes to Church.

Draw yourself in the church.

UNIT 5:42

SOMETIMES I DON'T WANT TO SHARE

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. realize that sometimes they are selfish

b. want to be unselfish

BACKGROUND:

When our First Parents, Adam and Eve sinned, they introduced selfishness into the human family. Every one of their descendants experiences the effects of selfishness. Although Jesus and Mary were totally unselfish, they experienced the effects of selfishness more deeply than anyone else. Selfishness, which is at work in each of us, can be overcome to some extent by prayer and self-sacrifice. Everyone has to learn to think of others. In giving us The Great Commandment, Jesus challenges our selfishness. "Love your neighbor as yourself," Mt 22:39b.

Teachers know how to lead children to think of others and how to encourage them in self-sacrifice. This is very important in their education.

REFLECTION:

Do I take up the challenge of my own selfishness?

PREPARE:

Scripture: God wants us to care for each other. Ref 1 Cor 13:1f **Examples:** Prepare examples of unselfishness from everyday life

Song: We are one big happy family, page 53

Story: THE SELFISH CHILDREN

One day, as the children were going home from school, they were running and jumping along the road. Suddenly Joan hurt her leg and had to sit down. It was paining so much that she couldn't walk. The other children saw Joan sitting there holding her leg, but they didn't bother to help her. They just went on enjoying themselves. One of the boys called out, "Get a stick and you'll get along all right. We're going home." Oh, Poor Joan!

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Story: The Selfish Children

Why didn't the children help Joan?

Children realize that it was selfishness that caused them to leave Joan by herself on the road.

Children think of times when they did not wait and help someone or lend something. Perhaps they were selfish, too.

Discuss: Examples from everyday life

Children become aware that unselfishness is seen in everyday life.

How does the mother / nurse show that she is unselfish? Children appreciate what it means to be unselfish.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: God wants us to care for each other. Ref 1 Cor 13:1f

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

What does God want us to do?

Consider: God loves and cares for everyone and wants you to do the same. He doesn't want you to be selfish.

Prayer: Let us ask God our Father to help us to be unselfish.

Song: We are one big happy family
Children feel that it is good to be unselfish in their "big" family.

FOR MY LIFE: After school, I will go and help.......(name)

Children dramatize the story.

Children make sentences: e.g. My mother is unselfish, she ... for me.

Children think of times when they were selfish. Say, God, I'm sorry I was selfish.

Children sing with actions.

SOMETIMES I DON'T LISTEN TO MY PARENTS

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. realize that they should listen to their parents

b. feel sorry for not listening to their parents

BACKGROUND:

The Bible tells about many different kinds of sins. The first sin recorded is a sin of disobedience. God said to Adam, "You may eat the fruit of any tree in the garden, except the tree that gives knowledge of what is good and what is bad. You must not eat the fruit of that tree; if you do, you will die the same day," Gen 2:16f. The story goes on, "So (Eve) took some of the fruit and ate it. Then she gave some to her husband, and he also ate it." Gen 3:6b.

This same spirit of disobedience is born in us and we often have to struggle against it. The Bible has several verses encouraging parents to train their children in a spirit of obedience. The Fourth Commandment is addressed to everyone, not only to children, because God wants obedient people.

REFLECTION:

Could I be described as an obedient person?

PREPARE:

Scripture: God want His children to be obedient. Cf "Obey the commands of the Lord your God," Deut 4:2b.

Story: THE DISOBEDIENT CHILD

One day it was raining very heavily so Michael said to his son, Michael Junior, "Don't ride the bicycle today. You might skid and fall off." Michael Junior said, "Okay, Dad, I'll stay at home." But he really wanted to go to his friend's house and he loved riding his bicycle! Michael Junior knew that his father was going to the market after lunch and so he waited. After his father had gone, Michael Junior wheeled out his bicycle and off he went. When he came back, he put the bicycle away very quietly in its place behind the kitchen!

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children remember things that they were told to do. e.g. My mother told me to sweep up the leaves. Teacher asks: Did you do it (continue)

Teacher: Introduce one or two School Rules and encourage the children to follow them.

Story: The Disobedient Child

What did Michael's father say? What did Michael do?

Children understand the meaning of disobedience. Notice that Michael was not punished. He did not fall off the bicycle. But, he was disobedient.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: God wants His children to be obedient. Ref Deut 4:2b.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Do you think that God was pleased with what Michael did?

Consider: God wants children to listen to their parents and teachers. He helps you to be obedient and blesses you when you obey.

Prayer: Let us ask God our Father to help us to listen to our parents and teachers and to do whatever they tell us

Children memorize the rules.

Say: I will keep these rules.

Children retell the story.

Children draw themselves doing something their parents told them to do.

Teacher and children pray.

FOR MY LIFE: When my mother (father) tells me to...... I will do it.



SOMETIMES I DON'T WANT TO GO TO CHURCH

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. realize that sometimes they don't feel like going to Church (Mass)

b. feel that it is important for them to go to Mass

BACKGROUND:

Feelings play a very important part in life. They make life exciting and challenging. However, we need to learn to understand our feelings and to master them. When people try to solve their problems with their feelings, they usually end by making matters worse. Joy and peace and love are good, helpful feelings. They can be enjoyed and cultivated.

It is true that we don't always feel like doing our duty and that isn't wrong. But, it is possible to overcome our feelings and to get on with what we are supposed to do.

Feelings are very important to small children. Many teachers understand this and know how to help them to deal with their feelings.

REFLECTION:

Am I learning to deal with my feelings?

PREPARE:

Flash card: Sunday is God's day.

Picture: A Church Scene.Page 246.

Song: This is the Day (Lesson 10)

Story: THE SUNNY BRIDGE

Joseph used to often tell his friends stories about the big river near his village and about the bridge where people often sat trying to catch fish. One Sunday morning, Joseph wanted to go fishing. He thought he might be lucky enough to catch a fish for himself. But, he knew that his parents were getting ready for Mass and this made him feel cross. He kept thinking about the sunny bridge and the fish. It was very hard for him to give up the idea of going fishing!

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Everyone has a special job to do at home / at school, but sometimes they don't feel like doing it.

Children share: It's my job to, but sometimes I don't feel like doing it.

Teacher: I understand, but you should do your job. (continue)

They realize that important things must be done.

Story: The Sunny Bridge

Why was it hard for Joseph to go to Mass with his parents?

Joseph knew that going to Mass is important and so he changed his mind.

Picture: Church Scene

Why are these people going to church?

Children realize that it is important to go to Mass on Sundays and that many people go even when they have other things to do.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Flash card: Sunday is God's day.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Which day is God's special day?

Consider: Sunday is God's day. God wants you to think of Him every Sunday and go to Mass. He wants you to leave your work and your games and to go to Mass every Sunday. It is important to go to Mass.

Song: This is the day

FOR MY LIFE: I will go to Mass on Sundays.

Children retell the story.

Children draw themselves going to Mass.

Write: "Sunday" and decorate it.

Children sing:

SOMETIMES I DON'T SPEAK NICELY TO OTHERS

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. realize that sometimes they speak roughly to others

b. give up speaking roughly to others

BACKGROUND:

It is not uncommon to hear people complain about noise which they describe as "pollution". The noise of traffic bothers many townspeople. Trucks and cars tear past their homes day and night. Factory workers are often weary from the noise of machinery. After putting up with this all day long at work, should they have to listen to loud, rough talking in their homes? Sometimes, thoughtless people turn up their radios to full volume and use amplifiers so that no one in the neighbourhood escapes. What is all this noise doing to people?

Everyone needs to pay attention to his / her tone of voice and realize that it is a mark of respect to speak politely.

REFLECTION:

Do I try to speak politely to others, especially to the children I teach?

PREPARE:

Scripture: Don't shout at anyone. (Ref Eph 4:31b)

Examples: Times when you've heard rough speaking

Story: THE SAD MOTHER

Once there was a mother who lived with her children in a little bush village. The mother's name was Celine. Celine was very sad because not one of her children spoke nicely to her. They always shouted at her. One of them would call out, "Where's my food?" Another one would shout, "I want my shirt." Then two or three would shout out together, "Why don't you light the fire for us? We're always cold, here!" Every day, Celine would hear her children talking to each other, but the words she heard only made her sad... Shut up! I won't! Do it yourself! Get out! One day Celine said to herself, "I wish my children would try to speak nicely. I'm so tired of all this rough talk."

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children remember times when someone spoke roughly to them. How did you feel when this happened to you? They realize that rough speech hurts them and others.

Story: The Sad Mother

Why was Celine so sad?

Children realize that no one likes to be spoken to roughly or to listen to rough speaking.

Sharing examples:

Children listen to 2 or 3 examples.

They become more aware that rough speaking hurts them and others and spoils family and community life.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: Don't shout at anyone. Ref Eph 4:31b.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

How does God want you to speak?

Consider: You are God's children and He loves you. He wants you to remember that you belong to His family and that you ought to speak nicely to everyone.

Prayer: Let us pray:

God our Father help us to show our love for one another by always speaking nicely. We are sorry for the times when we spoke roughly at home and at school.

FOR MY LIFE: I will never speak roughly.

Children practise saying things nicely e.g. Please ... (Use a pleasant tone of voice.)

Troubs.

Children remember times when they spoke roughly. Say: We are sorry for speaking roughly.

Teacher leads the prayer.

PRAYER SERVICE

WE ARE SORRY THAT WE DO NOT ALWAYS LIVE AS GOD'S CHILDREN

PREPARE:

The Bible:

Display the Bible in a suitable place and invite the children to decorate it.

Scripture: Eph 5:1f (paraphrase)

Since you are God's dear children, you must try to be like Him. You must try to love everyone just as He does. He treats everyone very nicely. God is pleased when His children share their things, when they listen to their parents and teachers and when they speak nicely to each other. God is always happy when His children go to Mass.

Pictures:

Put up the pictures and drawings used in Unit 5, Lesson 42-45.

Stories:

Revise the stories used in Unit 5, Lesson 42-45. Use them as a "shared homily".

Response:

God our Father we are sorry.

(Write this on a chart or on the Blackboard. Make your own tune.)

Offertory:

Invite the children to prepare an offering as a sign that they are sorry for the times when they have not lived as God's children.

PRAYER SERVICE

Introduction: Welcome the children to the Prayer Service.

We are all God's children. He knows and loves each one of us and wants us to live together as His own special family. But sometimes we do not live as His children. Now we want to show that we are sorry and to ask Him to help us to live as good children.

Opening Prayer:

God our Father, we have come to You today to show that we are sorry for the times when we have not lived together as your good children.

Scripture: Let us listen to what God is saying to us today:

Eph 5:1f (Paraphrased above. Hold the Bible as though reading from it.)

Instruction: What is God saying to us today?

(**Teacher**: Make use of a few pictures and one or two stories used in Unit 5, Lessons 42-45)

Pause:

Children think of times

- when they did not share their things with others
- when they did not listen to their parents ...
- when they did not speak nicely to others ...
- · when they did not go to church.

Praver:

God our Father, we know that we have not always lived as your good children and so now we want to say that we are sorry

- for the times we have been selfish and not shared our things (Response)
- for the times we have disobeyed our parents and teachers (Response)
- for the times when we spoke roughly to others (Response)
- for the times we did not go to Mass on Sunday (Response)

Procession:

Children bring their offering to God. (Sing an offertory hymn that is well-known in the parish.)

Final Song:

We are one big happy family

GOD MADE THE WORLD

The children will -**OBJECTIVES:**

a. learn that God made the world

b. thank God for making the world so beautiful

BACKGROUND:

The Bible begins with the story of Creation. It tells us that before God made the world, there was nothing and no one, only darkness and disorder. Then it goes on to say that God made everything: day and night, the sky and the water, the dry land and the oceans, the heavenly bodies. the plants and animals and, last of all, human beings.

The Bible tells us that God made everything by the power of His word. It says, "God commanded," and repeats this seven times in the story. No one interfered with God or advised Him or helped Him in any way.

Creation was entirely His work and it was very good in His eyes.

God's purpose in making the world was to share His life and happiness with the human family. In the work of Creation, God's goodness was made known on earth.

REFLECTION:

Do I take time to admire God's work of Creation?

PREPARE:

Scripture: God made the world. Ref Gen 1:1f

Pictures: Natures scenes e.g. rivers, oceans, plants etc

Song: page 94

1. Who made all the things on earth? (4x)

2. Who made all the flowers that bloom? (4x) God from heaven above.



Children name things in nature that they like.

Children draw things that God has made.

Children sing.

Teacher leads the prayer.

FOR MY LIFE:

As I am coming to school, I will sing the song Who made all the things on earth....





GOD MADE DAY AND NIGHT

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. learn that God gave them the day for working and the night for sleeping

b. thank God for day and for night

BACKGROUND:

The Bible tells us that the dark of night is under God's control and that it is good. It is part of His creation. He made it so that we would have time to rest and sleep. In God's plan, day-time is for working and night-time is for sleeping.

The moon and stars are signs of God's presence; He watches over us while we sleep.

REFLECTION:

In the work of Creation, God gave everything its own special purpose. Do I try to discover and respect God's purpose in everything?

PREPARE:

Scripture: God named the light "Day" and the darkness "Night." Gen 1:5

Sketches: sleeping mat / pillow etc

Song: page 96


Good morning (x2), and how do you do? Good morning (2x), a happy day to you.

Good night and good night (2x) and good night to you.

Good night and good night (2x) and may God watch over you.

Story: GOD MADE DAY AND NIGHT

God made the world so that His family would be happy. First, God made light and then He made darkness. God called the light "day" and the darkness "night". When God looked at what He had made and He was very pleased because it all looked so good and beautiful. He wanted everyone to be happy; He wanted everyone to have a time for working and a time for sleeping.' (Refer Gen 1:3-5)



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children share their experience of waking up in the mornings and looking forward to doing many things. They also share their experience of night-time and how they like going to sleep after their long day at school.

What time do people go to work? What time do they come home?

Children realize that "day" is the right time for working and playing.

Sketches: Sleeping mat, pillow etc

What are these things for? When do we use them?

Children think of night as the right time for resting and sleeping, for getting ready for work.

Important greetings: Good morning: Good night

Children become aware of the importance of greeting each other as day begins and as the night comes on. They learn to use these greetings.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: God named the light DAY and the darkness NIGHT.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Who made day and night? Why did God make day and night?

Consider: God wants us to work during the day and to sleep at night so as to be ready for our work next day.

Prayer: Children thank God for day and night

FOR MY LIFE:: I will say Good Morning and Good Night to everyone.

Children mime getting up / going to bed.

Children draw themselves going to school.

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Children draw themselves sleeping at night.

Children greet each other.

Children sing: Good morning.

Teacher children pray

GOD MADE THE SUN

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

- a. learn that God made the sun and become aware that they enjoy its light and colour
- b. thank God for giving them the sun

BACKGROUND:

Many people living in the Bible Lands believed that the sun was a god. They worshipped it and had special celebrations in its honour.

Although God's people admired the sun, they realized that it was something God made for them. In their prayers of praise, they called on the sun to join in praise of God, the Creator of all things. "Sun and moon, praise the Lord" Ps 148:3.

REFLECTION:

God is greater than anything He made.

PREPARE:

Scripture: God made the sun. Ref Gen 1:14-20.


Drawing: The Sun / sunrise / sunset

Song: Who made the sun so bright and warm? (4x) page 94

God from heaven above.

Story: GOD MADE THE SUN (based on Gen 1:14-19)

God made the sun and put it in the sky so that there would always be daylight and colour in the world. When He saw how big and bright and warm it was, He was so pleased. God loved the sunlight and all the beautiful colours that He could see in the sunlight. He wanted many people to enjoy the sun and all the lovely colours in the world.

Scripture: God made the sun

(based on Gen 1:14-19)

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE

Song: Who made the sun

Consider: God loves you and wants you to be happy. He made the sun so that you can enjoy sunlight everyday and see all the lovely colours in the world.

Prayer: God our Father, we thank you for making the sun. It is so big and bright and we are happy we can see all the lovely colours in the world.

Children draw the sun

and colour the sky.

Children re-tell the story.

Children sing. Children name the colours they often see.

Teacher leads the prayer

FOR MY LIFE:

I will take my drawing home and say the prayer: Thank you God for making the sun.

THE SUN HELPS US

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. become aware that the sun helps them in many ways

b. feel thankful to God for giving them the sun

BACKGROUND:

According to the Creation Story, Gen 1:1f God is the cause of light, not the sun. In the beginning, God commanded, "Let there be light - and light appeared," Gen 1:3. When God made the sun, the moon and the stars, He put them in the sky to separate day from night and to mark days, years and special times for religious festivals. Ref Gen 1:14. They were not for adoration as some people thought. They are 'the work of God's hands' and God made them for our benefit.

REFLECTION:

"The city of God has no need of the sun to shine on it, because the glory of God shines on it,..." Ref. Rev 21:23

PREPARE:

Flash card: God made the sun

Drawings: Clothes on a line / a child lying in the sun

An excursion (or bring a few plants)



Scripture: God made the moon and the stars to light up the sky at night.

Drawings: The moon and stars

Story: GOD MADE THE MOON AND STARS

After God had made the sky, He put lights in it to light up the earth. God made the sun for day-time and the moon and stars for night-time. 

BIRDS SING FOR US

The **ibis** knows when the river will flood and the **rooster** knows when the rain will fall ... they watch; they are not caught unprepared!

The ostrich is strong and fast, but hopelessly foolish and reckless.

The **swallow** likes to be close to God; she lays her eggs in His sanctuary and her little ones come out in His presence.

At the baptism of Jesus, the Holy Spirit appeared as a gentle bird, a dove. Jesus wanted so much to save His people; He wanted to gather them around Himself "as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings," Mt 23:37.

REFLECTION:

What appreciation do I have for God's gift of birds?

PREPARE:

Drawing: Birds

Feathers: Collect or draw

Song:

Who made all the birds that fly (3x) page 94

Who made all the birds that fly

God in heaven above.

Story: GOD MADE BIRDS (Ref Gen 1:20)

When God had finished making the sky, He thought how nice it would be to fill the sky with birds and so He made all kinds of birds ... big ones and small ones, some with beautiful bright feathers and others not so bright. But God liked them all and He gave them the gift of song.

Consider: God loves you very much and wants you to be happy. He likes you to enjoy the birds and to think of Him when you see them or hear them singing.

Prayer: Thank you God for giving us birds. We are happy when we see them in our gardens and in the bush and when we hear them singing.

FOR MY LIFE: I will never harm birds.

Children draw birds and colour them.

Children decorate a child with feathers.

Children sing

Children display their drawings

Teacher and children pray.









GOD CARES FOR THE BIRDS

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. become aware that God cares for the birds

b. be careful not to harm birds because God made them

BACKGROUND:

Jesus used the image of birds to help us to appreciate how much God loves and cares for us. He tells us to learn from the birds the meaning of trust in God, our Father. Even though they know nothing of planting and harvesting, they do not go hungry because God Himself feeds them. Jesus said that nothing happens to even the smallest and plainest of birds without God knowing about it. "Aren't you worth more than many sparrows?" Mt 6:26.

REFLECTION:

God is honoured when we respect His gifts.

PREPARE:



Jesus' own Province, Galilee, was well-known for its lovely wild-flowers. Jesus referred to them in His Sermon on the Mount when He explained that true religion calls for complete trust in God. "And why worry about clothes? Look how the wild flowers grow: they do not work or make clothes for themselves. But I tell you that not even King Solomon with all his wealth had clothes as beautiful as one of these flowers," Mt 6:28-29.

REFLECTION:

Spend time admiring flowers. How beautiful your creation is, my God!

PREPARE:

Fresh flowers: One for each child **Drawing:** Different kinds of flowers

Poster:

Thank you God for flowers. (Decorate)

Song:



•They have to become beautiful and this takes time. Becoming beautiful is a process for butterflies, and for people, too. But God wants all of us to be beautiful and sometimes He hides us away to give us time to think and pray. The full beauty of butterflies is seen only in sunlight: the full beauty of people is seen only in the light of God's presence.

REFLECTION:

What could I learn about my life from butterflies?





The Bible people introduced their God to others as "The God Who made Heaven and Earth," Jon 1:9. They were very proud of God's "handiwork" and saw in it a reflection of His glory.

REFLECTION:

God did not need the world for Himself. He made it for us to live in. How do I show that I appreciate my home?

PREPARE:

Scripture: The world belongs to God. Ref Ps 24:1

Sketch: Rubbish bins

Story: "A GIRL CALLED KATE"

Kate was the youngest in her family and she was in Prep Everyday, before she went to school, Kate had some little jobs to do at home. She watered the flowers and then picked up all the rubbish around the house and put it right into the rubbish bin near the kitchen. When she's finished, she calls out, "Mama, I'm going now. Goodbye."

Kate and her parents were proud of their nice, clean place.





Her mother said, "If you look after it carefully, it grow into a very big tree and it will make our place look very, very nice." So Miriam watered her tree every week and cleared around it. It grew up straight and soon it was taller than Miriam herself.



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Teacher and children take a walk around the play-ground to look at the trees.

Which tree did you like best?

Did you see any trees that have been spoiled?

How did you feel when you saw these trees?

Children see that trees are beautiful and that it's sad to see trees that have been spoiled.

Drawing: Trees

Children take time to admire the trees. They remember that God made them and that they need trees.

Discussion: How to look after trees.

Children learn that God is pleased when they look after trees and is disappointed when they spoil them.

Story: Miriam's Tree

Why did Miriam and her mother plant trees? How did Miriam look after her tree?

God is pleased when you plant trees and look after them. He makes them grow for you and He does not want you to spoil them by chopping them for nothing or by cutting your names into them.

Song: Thank you God for giving us trees

Prayer: God our Father, we thank you for the gift of trees. We will look after our trees and never spoil them.

Draw trees.

Children draw themselves watering a little tree.

Children say how they look after trees.

Children re-tell the story.

Children sing.

Teacher and children pray.

OUR FOOD GARDENS

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. realize that their food gardens are a sign of God's care for them

b. ask God to bless their gardens

BACKGROUND:

The Bible uses the image of a garden as a way of expressing God's love and care for His people and their land. Because most of the people of Israel were gardeners, this "picture" would have appealed to them. The Bible calls God 'the gardener of Israel' and, although He did everything that a careful gardener would do, His 'garden' (His people) failed to produce anything good. He was disappointed to find that "every grape was sour!" Ref Is 5:1-2.

REFLECTION:

When I work in my garden, I continue God's work of Creation.

PREPARE:

Scripture: God planted a garden ... and He made all kinds of beautiful

food grow there. Ref Gen 2:8-9

Song: page 120

How I love, how I love ,how I love my garden.

Thank you God, thank you God, thank you for my garden.

Story: Tami and the New Garden

Tami lives with his family in a village not far away. He's in Grade 1 and goes to school everyday so he doesn't have much spare time!

One Saturday, his father said: "Tami, there's no school today. How would you like to come to the bush with me and help me to make a new garden?" Tami was very happy to spend the day in the garden with his

father. They worked hard all day and were really very tired.

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children name the different kinds of food they get from their gardens. They realize how important their gardens are.

Story: Tami and the New Garden

What did Tami and his father do?
What did God do for the new garden?

Children understand that God blesses their gardens. They dig and plant and God sends sun and rain.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: God planted a garden ... He made all kinds of beautiful food grow there. Ref Gen 2:8-9.

Children wonder about God's garden.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

What do you do in your garden?

Children realize that God shows His care for them by blessing their gardens and making them produce food. He is happy to see them neat and clean. God likes you to work in your gardens.

Prayer: Let us ask God to bless our gardens.

Song: How I love ...

Children express the happiness they feel about their gardens.

FOR MY LIFE: I will visit my garden and ask God to bless it.

Draw Tami and his father going to the garden at sunrise.

Draw yourself cleaning your garden.

Children pray.

Children sing.



WE THANK GOD FOR OUR GARDENS

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. learn that God helps them to have good gardens

b. thank God for their gardens

BACKGROUND:

It is clear, from many of His parables, that Jesus understood the work of gardening very well. He had studied seeds closely and knew all about planting, caring for gardens and harvesting.

In describing the Mystery of the Kingdom of God, Jesus used the image of the growing seed. He noted that the tiniest seed has a power in itself for growth. And growth goes on unnoticed. This is how it is, Jesus said, with God's Kingdom.

REFLECTION:

I cannot make seeds to grow, but I can help them to grow.

PREPARE:

Scripture: God makes plants grow for us. Ref Ps 104:14f. Samples: Bring seeds / vegetables to show the children

Song: How I love my garden.. Lesson 60

Story: ANNA PLANTS A GARDEN

One Saturday morning Anna got up at sunrise and went to her garden to get the soil ready for new seeds. She cleared the ground and made the soil fine and nice for the little seeds. As she planted her seeds and watered them carefully, Anna thought about all the lovely food she would have later on.

Anna remembered to weed and water her plants and God sent sun and rain to help them to grow well. Then one day, she brought home a nice big cabbage. Her mother said: "Anna, that's a beautiful cabbage. You worked very hard in your garden and you see that God has blessed it."

Children learn that they can talk to God while they are working in their gardens; they can thank Him and ask Him to bless their work.

Scripture: God makes plants grow for us. Ref Ps 104.14f.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

What does God do for your gardens?

God shows His care for you by making food grow in your garden. This food keeps you well and happy. You should thank God for it.

GOD GIVES US WATER

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. become aware of water as a wonderful gift from God

b. thank God for His gift of water

BACKGROUND:

Because their rainfall was low, the people of the Bible Lands really appreciated the value of water. They had to depend on wells and springs or on cisterns for their water supply. They liked best to drink "living water", which was water from wells and springs. One of their customs was to offer water to thirsty travellers.

In Chapter 4 of his Gospel, St John presents Jesus to his readers as a tired, thirsty traveller who asks a woman for a drink from a well. They talk together about water and life and worship of God. Gradually, Jesus leads her on to the realization that He is able to give her the "living water" of eternal life. She believes in Him and knows "that she will never be thirsty again."

REFLECTION:

Water is a sign of life and growth and cleansing. In our Christian life, it is a sign of eternal life.

PREPARE:

Scripture: God made

God made rain water and sea water. Ref Gen 1:6-7

Pictures:

Rivers/ lakes / people using water

Song:

Music page 54

Get some water, get some water

Water is for cleaning, water is for washing,

Story: CHILDREN WHO LOVED WATER

Mark and Mary are very lucky children because they live near a river. Even when they were small babies, their mother used to put them into the river and wash their little bodies all over. UNIT 8:67

GOD'S SON CAME TO LIVE ON EARTH

OBJECTIVES: The

The children will -

a. become aware that God's Son came to live with us and His name was Jesus

b. want to know and love God's Son

BACKGROUND:

This is an important and difficult lesson because now the teacher introduces the children to a great mystery of Faith, the Mystery of Godmade-Man. St John writes about it in these words: "The Word became man and, full of grace and truth, lived among us." Jn 1:14.

Perhaps many of the children already know Jesus, but nevertheless, the teacher introduces Him in a formal way. He is God's Son; His mother is Mary of Nazareth; He has come into this world to redeem and save it. His 'special' name, Jesus, means "Saviour".

Here are three great Scripture passages about the Mystery of God-made-Man: Mt 1:18-2:23; Luke 1:5-25:2; John 1:1-18.

Up to this point in the Programme, the teacher has been helping the children to grow in their relationship with **God their Father** through experiencing His goodness in their own lives and in the work of Creation. Now, they begin to deepen their relationship with God the Father through Jesus.

REFLECTION:

JESUS' MOTHER MARY

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. hear that God chose Mary to be Jesus' Mother

BACKGROUND:

There are many references to Mary in the O.T. and the N.T. The Old Testament speaks in different ways about a particular woman who is to have a special part in putting down the serpent (Gen 3,15), and who is to bear a son whose name will be Immanuel (Is 7.14, Mic 5:2-3). The mysterious O.T. references become quite clear in the New Testament, for example, "The angel had a message for a girl promised in marriage to a man named Joseph, who was a descendant of King David. The girl's name was Mary." Lk 1:27. Catholics reflect deeply on Mary's role in the work of Salvation and honour her with gratitude.

REFLECTION:

Because of her faith, Mary had a special part in the mystery of Salvation.

Pictures: Mary and Jesus. Page 193

Poster: Write the prayer, "Hail Mary ... Jesus."
An altar in honour of Mary (Children help)

Story: A MOTHER FOR GOD'S SON (Ref. Lk 1:26-36)

Once, in a little village called Nazareth, there lived a beautiful young girl named Mary. God liked her so much that He chose her to be the mother of His Son, Jesus.

He sent an angel from Heaven to ask Mary if she would be willing to be the mother of His Son. When Mary understood what God wanted, she said 'Yes' to Him. So God made Mary the mother of His Son, Jesus.

 Joseph hold the little child, rock him, rock him off to sleep. He will dream of angels bright, and stars and kings and sheep so white - o Jesus.



Story: JOSEPH OF NAZARETH (based on Mt 1:18-25)

Everyone liked Joseph of Nazareth. The village people used to say: "Joseph is a very good young man. He is a very good carpenter; he never tricks anyone."

One day Joseph told his uncle that he would like to get married. His uncle said, "That's very good news. Who would you like to marry?" Joseph said that he liked Mary, and wanted to marry her. She also lived in Nazareth. Joseph's uncle sent a present to Mary and she was very happy to accept it because she knew that Joseph was a very good man.

Joseph and Mary got married and Joseph knew that it was his special work to look after God's Son, Jesus. He loved Mary and the baby Jesus very much and looked after them very, very well.



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children describe how their fathers look after them. What does your father do for you?

They appreciate their father's care.

How do little children feel being with their father?

Children realize that fathers are very special. They love and care for their children in many ways.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: Joseph of Nazareth (adapted)

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Who did Joseph marry?
What special work did he do for God?

Children are introduced to Joseph and realize that God chose him to look after Jesus.

Picture: Joseph with Jesus

Children understand that Jesus loved Joseph. He worked hard as a carpenter to make a nice home for Jesus.

Why did Jesus love St Joseph?

God wanted Jesus to live in a family and so He chose Joseph of Nazareth to make a happy home for Him. Jesus likes us to pray to Joseph.

Song: Joseph hold the little child

JESUS HELPED ST JOSEPH

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. suggest ways in which Jesus might have helped St Joseph

b. want to help their fathers as Jesus did

BACKGROUND:

The people of the Bible had great respect for trades. Young Jewish boys had to learn trades. Joseph was a carpenter and Jesus followed this same trade until he began his work of preaching and teaching.

Other trades well-known to the Jewish people were spinning and weaving, dyeing cloth, pottery making, tent-making, and carving. Besides trades, there was a wide range of agricultural activities and professions open to young Jewish boys.

REFLECTION:

"Discipline your son and give him work to do, or else he will be an embarrassment to you." Sir 30:13.

PREPARE:

Picture: Joseph and Jesus, page 253

Story: THE BOY WHO HELPED HIS FATHER

Dermot's father was a mechanic. There were old broken- down cars and trucks all around his house. Whenever cars or trucks broke down, people brought them to Dermot's father to fix them because he was a good workman and never tricked anyone. He'd work all day and, sometimes, nearly all night, too. You see, he always felt sorry for people who had trouble with their cars and trucks.

Whenever his father was working, you'd see Dermot with him. He could guess which tools his father needed and away he'd go to get them. He could see when his father needed a rag and off he'd go at full speed for it. He knew all the spare parts by name. He was such a big help to his father and he was learning to be a good mechanic himself!



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Discuss: How children help their father.

Children realize that their fathers are happy when they help them.

Story: The Boy Who Helped His Father

Children understand that Dermot's father needed help and that Dermot learned many things from helping his father.

They become more aware of the importance of helping fathers.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Pictures: Joseph and Jesus

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Children understand:

- 1. that Joseph looked after Jesus like a father
- 2. that Joseph was a carpenter.

Children suggest ways in which Jesus might have helped Joseph. They realize that God was pleased when Jesus helped Joseph.

What could you do to help your father?

JESUS PRAYED WITH HIS PARENTS

In Jewish homes, religion and family life were inter-woven. Children learned the religious history of Israel from their parents; they celebrated the religious festivals in their homes and, from their parents' example and guidance, they acquired the Wisdom of their ancestors. Moses taught parents that it was their duty to explain to their children all that God had done for them. They were to answer their children's questions about religion, carefully. (Ref Jos 4:5-7)

There were no schools such as we have today. Girls learned home-making skills from their mothers and boys were taught useful trades by their fathers. "He who does not teach his son a useful trade is bringing him up to be a thief." (A Jewish saying.)

REFLECTION:

What importance do I give to family prayer?

PREPARE:

Picture: A Family Praying. Page 254


Song: The Holy Family in front of their house Father in heaven I give to you today

Story: A MESSAGE FOR EVERYONE

Father Patrick was a priest who lived in a big country called America. Father Patrick visited many, many countries because he had a very important message for families. His message was that families should pray together.

Picture: A family praying together

Children understand that when families pray together, they are like the Holy Family.

FOR MY LIFE: I will pray with my parents.

Discuss Father Patrick's message.

JESUS' FAMILY LIVED IN A VILLAGE

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. be able to say that Jesus' family lived in a village called Nazareth

b. try to make their villages happy places

BACKGROUND:

Many tourists and pilgrims go to visit the village of Nazareth to honour its only famous son, Jesus. Nazareth is situated in Galilee and is quite large today. In Bible times it was much smaller. Nazareth was the home of Mary and Joseph and the place where Jesus spent most of His life. It was at Nazareth that the Annunciation of the Lord took place. Mary and Joseph set out from Nazareth to go to Bethlehem and, after King Herod's death, they came back and settled there again. Since He lived in Nazareth for about thirty years, He was well-known to the local people. They called Him the son of Joseph, the carpenter and Mary. Jesus set out from Nazareth on His teaching mission and often returned to His home, there. When the time came for Him to go to Jerusalem, Jesus finally left Nazareth.

PREPARE:

Flash card: "Nazareth" in large letters

Story: LOUISE LEAVES HER VILLAGE

When Louise was old enough to start school, her uncle took her to live in town. But she was not happy at all. True, her uncle looked after her, but she was always thinking about her village.

She thought about the garden and the pigs; about the river and the children she played with. When people passed her in the street without smiling, she'd cry for the people she knew in her village. They were so friendly! Louise remembered how quiet it was at night in the village and how safe she felt there. Poor Louise, she really missed her village.



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children describe what they see and do in their village.

They deepen their appreciation of village life.

Story: Louise Leaves Her Village

Children understand that it was very hard for Louise to leave her village. They feel sorry for her.

Would you find it hard to leave your village?

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Flash Card: "Nazareth "

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE

Children learn that Jesus' village was named "Nazareth". Nazareth was very important to Jesus; He loved His village. It was hard for Jesus to leave Nazareth.

Children imagine Jesus sharing in village life in Nazareth. (Jesus worked, played, visited families, prayed with others in the village.)

Prayer: Jesus, thank you for living with your parents in the village of Nazareth. Help us to make our villages good and happy places

FOR MY LIFE: I will ask Jesus to bless my village.



ABRAHAM TRUSTED GOD

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. become aware that Jesus liked to hear stories about His ancestors

b. trust in God as Abraham did

BACKGROUND:

God's work of Salvation began with the call of Abraham, Gen 12:1-9. The Bible remembers him because of his faith in God and shows that nothing was too difficult for this man of faith.

Jesus admired Abraham's great faith and praised his ancestor saying, "Abraham rejoiced that he was to see the time of my coming; he saw it and was glad," Jn 8:56. Jesus told the religious leaders of His time that they were not like their ancestor, Abraham! God could do nothing for them because they did not believe.

REFLECTION:

To have faith in God means to be sure that God will keep his promises. Ref Heb 11:1

PREPARE:

A Story: Make up a story about a family who left their own province and went to live in another province.

Flash cards: "Canaan" / "Abraham"

Story: ABRAHAM TRUSTED GOD (ref Gen 12:1-9)

One day God spoke to Jesus' ancestor, Abraham and said, "Leave your country and go to a land that I am going to show you. I will give you many children ..." Gen 12:1-2. So he got ready to leave his home and go to the land that God told him about. His workmen helped him to pack up his things. He had lots of sheep and goats and cattle and, of course he didn't want to leave them behind. His wife, Sara washed the clothes and cleaned the saucepans and put them all in a big bilum. When Abraham saw that everything was ready, he said, "Okay, we're ready now! I'm not sure where we're going, but God will be with us." Abraham and Sara and a few other people went along, too. They walked and walked and after a long time they came to a new country called Canaan. Abraham thanked God for looking after them all the way to Canaan.

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LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children share stories: Families who left home and went to live in another place.

They realize that it is very hard to make a long journey and to live with strangers.

Story: A Family Who Went Away

Children realize that, when families go to live in a new place they worry about many things.

Flash Cards: Abraham / Canaan

Children are introduced to Abraham, Jesus' ancestor who lef his home and went to a new country called Canaan.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: Abraham Trusted God, Ref Gen 12:1-4

Children are happy that Abraham trusted that God would keep him safe on his long journey and show him where to go with his family.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Who looked after Abraham and his family?

Consider: Jesus liked this story about His ancestor, Abraham He was very proud of Abraham because he trusted in God.

Jesus is proud of you, too, when you trust in God. He knows that God will keep you safe and help you always.

Prayer: God my Father, I trust in You.

FOR MY LIFE: I will often say the prayer, God my Father, I trust in You.

Children mime the story.

BACK CHARLES

Children pronounce the names "Abraham" / "Canaan".

Children retell the story.

Children pray

GOD MADE A PROMISE

OBJECTIVES:

The children will -

a. hear another story about Jesus' ancestor, Abraham

b. trust in God

BACKGROUND:

When a person makes a promise, he puts himself on trial because now people wait to see if the promise will be carried out. If it comes true, their trust grows. If it fails to come true, their trust dies. God used promises to reveal Himself. Gradually, people learned that God is trustworthy; He never made empty promises. Through trust in God's promises, the Bible people achieved peace and salvation.

REFLECTION:

Am I faithful to my promises.

PREPARE:



LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: God Makes a Promise, Ref Gen 15:1-5

Children wonder about God's promise. When will it come true?

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Why was Abraham upset?

Consider: God keeps His promises, but you have to wait. He makes His promises come true at the right time. You can't tell God when to make His promises come true. You might have to wait a long time, but you can be sure God won't forget. He has promised to take us to Heaven.

Promises are important. Whenever you make a promise, you should make it come true.

Prayer: God our Father, you have promised to give us a new home in heaven. We trust in your promise; we look forward to seeing you in heaven.

Part A: Can you still remember Abraham's long walk to Canaan? It was a very long walk! Sometimes Abraham and Sarah felt very tired. Sarah's legs pained a lot and her bilum was so heavy to carry. Abraham felt sorry for her. He'd say, "Come on, Sarah. Keep going! You know that God wants us to go to Canaan. And remember He's promised to give us a new home and children."

Part B: At last Abraham and Sarah reached Canaan and built a house for themselves. They spent a lot of time working in their garden. Sarah often talked to Abraham about God's promise. She'd say, "I wonder when God's promise will come true! Why is He taking so long to give us children? Do you think He has forgotten? I'm getting very old. I'll look funny carrying a new baby?" And Abraham would say: "Well Sarah, I don't know. We'll just have to wait. God won't forget His promise."

One day some visitors came to Abraham's house. They said, "You and Sarah had better start getting ready now for a new baby. God is going to give it to you very soon."

So Abraham and Sarah got everything ready and one night Sarah had a lovely little baby boy! Abraham said, "Let's call him Isaac! He's made us so happy." And Sarah said: "True, nothing is too hard for God!"



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children share their experience: Getting ready for a new baby for their family.

What did you do? Did you have to wait a long time? Did you get tired of waiting?

They understand that waiting is not easy.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Revision: Story - God Made a Promise Ref Gen 12:1-4

Children realize that Abraham had to wait for God's promise to come true. God's promise did not come true all at once.

Story: (Part B) Ref Gen 21:1-8

Children realize that Abraham and Sarah felt strong when they remembered God's promise. God made it come true at last.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Poster: God keeps His promises

Children feel happy about the message on the poster. They feel that they can trust God.

Prayer: God our Father, we thank you for your promises. We know that you always keep your promises.

GOD SAVED MOSES

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. be able to say that God saved Moses

b. trust in God to keep them safe

REFLECTION:

"Lord, protect us day by day and save us in times of trouble." Is 33:2

PREPARE:

Drawing: Baby Moses in the Basket. Page 255

Flash Cards: Egypt / Moses / Miriam

Story: GOD SAVED MOSES (Ref Ex 1:1-2:11)

Part A: After Abraham died, his children left their own country and went to live in Egypt. But the King of Egypt didn't want to share his country with them. He said, "These children of Abraham are taking over my country. I'm going to stop this." And so he told the nurses, "Don't let the little boys live. Throw them in the river as soon as they are born."

Part B: The mothers tried very hard to save their baby boys. One clever mother made a strong basket and covered it with coal-tar and floated it on the river among the reeds. Then she put her baby in it and closed the lid. The baby's sister, stayed nearby all day to see that her little brother was all right.

Part C: One day when the king's daughter came to wash in the river, she heard a little baby crying. Then she noticed a basket floating on the river. When she opened it, she saw a beautiful, strong baby lying on his back kicking his legs. She said, "That must be one of those babies... but he's a fine baby! I'd like to have him myself." As she turned around, she saw a young girl coming towards her who came up and asked, "Would you like me to find a woman to give it milk?" (The king's daughter did not know that this girl was Moses' sister.) She ran off quickly and brought back the baby's own mother! The king's daughter named the baby, Moses, and took him to her own house. And everyday Moses' mother came to give him milk!

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children show how they gather round a story-teller to listen to traditional stories.

Today, you will hear stories about one of Jesus' great ancestors called Moses.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Story: Part A (Flash Card, "Egypt")

Children hear that God kept His promise to Abraham. Abraham did have many children and they were very "special" to God.

Story: Part B

Children feel sorry for the mothers and babies. They understand that God felt sorry for them and helped them.

Story: Part C (Flash Card, "Moses")

Children are happy that Baby Moses was saved.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Who do you think was watching over the baby Moses as he floated on the river?

Consider: God was watching over the baby Moses and God is always watching over you. He wants you to grow up and to be His friend. Special people (your mother, your sisters) look after you for God.

Prayer: God our Father, we ask you to watch over us and over all the little children in the world. Keep us safe from harm. We trust in You because You are our Father.

FOR MY LIFE: I will often ask God to keep me safe.

Children sing: Father Abraham

Children look at the drawing and discuss it.

SUPPORT:

The King's daughter finds the baby in the basket.

Teacher and children pray.



GOD HELPED DAVID

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. be able to tell the story, David and Goliath

b. trust in God's help

BACKGROUND:

The Bible praises King David and calls him the greatest king Israel ever had. He ruled God's People from about 1010 - 970 B.C. The most notable thing about King David was his fidelity to the covenant God made with the Chosen People in the time of Moses.

King David had the idea of building a house (Temple) for God where He could live and be worshipped by His people. The Prophet Nathan told David that God was pleased with this idea and that his son, Solomon would carry it out. Then he told David of God's promise: "I will make your kingdom last forever. Your dynasty will never end." Ref 2 Sam 7:1-17.

At the Annunciation of the Lord's birth, the Angel Gabriel quoted this promise to Mary. Ref Lk 1:26-38.

PREPARE:

Picture: David and Goliath. Page 256

Poster: God helps me

Story: GOD HELPED DAVID (Ref 1 Sm 17:12f)

God's people were very afraid of the Philistines who lived near them. At night they'd come around and steal from their gardens and carry away their sheep. Goliath, one of their soldiers, knew that every one was afraid of him because he was such a big strong soldier. He used to make fun of them calling out all the time, 'Come out and fight me.'

One day David, who was a young shepherd boy, heard Goliath and said, 'I'm not frightened. I'll go out and fight him. God will help me and I'll win.' He put a few flat stones in his pouch, prepared his catapult, picked up his stick and went to fight Goliath.

When Goliath saw him coming, he called out, "What's that stick for? Am I a dog?" But David said nothing. He put a stone in his catapult and shot it straight at Goliath. It struck him right on the forehead... and he dropped down dead!

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Pictures: David and Goliath

Children compare the shepherd boy and the soldier. What is the soldier wearing? What is he holding? etc.

They see that the soldier is strong and ready to fight while the shepherd boy is ready to look after his sheep

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: David and Goliath, Ref 1 Sm 17:12f.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Why was David able to beat Goliath?

Children understand that even though David was no match for Goliath, he was unafraid. He trusted in God. He knew that God would help him and that he would win.

Consider: God knows you and He is always ready to help you. When God is with you, there is no need to be afraid. He will keep you safe.

Poster: God helps me

Children realize that the message fits with the story, David and Goliath. It also tells them to trust in God.

Prayer: God our Father, stay with us always and help us. We trust in You.

FOR MY LIFE: I will often ask God to help me.

Children re-tell the story.

What are you afraid of? Teacher, make a list on the board.

Children read the message.

Class prays.

Among A.

THE BOY JESUS IN THE TEMPLE

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. be able to tell the story, The Boy Jesus in the Temple

b. want to go to God's House (Church)

BACKGROUND:

Jerusalem, which was the main city in Jesus' country, Palestine, was often called the Holy City. About 1,000 years before Jesus was born, King Solomon built a big temple there for God. This temple was known as God's House and the Jewish people believed that God lived there. They had great respect for it. It was their custom to go there to celebrate religious feasts. Like all good Jews, Jesus loved God's house and was happy to go there to celebrate the feasts. It would take Him several days to walk from Nazareth to Jerusalem.

REFLECTION:

Is it important to me to go to my church to celebrate religious feasts?

Scripture: The Boy Jesus in the Temple, Lk 2:41-52

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children are prepared for the story, The Boy Jesus in the Temple.

JESUS HAD SPECIAL HELPERS

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. hear that Jesus had 12 helpers called apostles

b. want to be one of Jesus' helpers

BACKGROUND:

Many of the great industries of the world began in a little workshop somewhere. When the workman became known for his work, he was able to invite others to come and learn from him and share his work. Jesus began His work of building the Kingdom of God in His little home in Nazareth. From there, He set out on His mission of teaching and healing. As people began coming to Him to hear His message and to be healed, Jesus realized that He needed helpers. He began calling men to come and learn from Him and to share His work. The twelve men who were specially chosen by Jesus are called the Twelve Apostles. The story, Jesus Chooses the Twelve Apostles can be found in three of the Gospels. See Mt 10:1-4; Mk 3:13-19; Lk 6:12-16.

REFLECTION:

In Baptism, I was called to be one of Jesus' special helpers.

PREPARE:

Scripture:

Jesus Chooses the Twelve Apostles, Lk 6:12-16



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Introduction to the Living Word:

Children are prepared for the story, Jesus Chooses the Twelve Apostles.

Jesus came into this world to do God's work. He came as a little baby and grew up with His parents, Mary and Joseph in a village called Nazareth. As a little boy, Jesus learned many things about God; His parents taught Him to pray and He looked forward to doing God's work. He often wondered who would help Him and at last He decided to have helpers whom He called the **Twelve Apostles**.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: Jesus Chooses the Twelve Apostles, Lk 6:12-16

Children hear the story and feel that the apostles must have been very happy to go with Jesus and work with Him.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

How many apostles can you name?

Consider: Jesus needed helpers and so He invited people to follow Him and be His helpers. They followed Jesus and shared His work.

Prayer: Jesus, thank you for calling the Apostles and sharing Your work with them. Please call many of us to be your helpers.

FOR MY LIFE: I will pray for people who help Jesus.

Children mime: Building a house.

Children learn the expression:

The Twelve Apostles

Display Name Cards, Children become familiar with Jesus and His apostles.

Children draw themselves with Jesus.

Teacher and children pray.

JESUS VISITED HIS FRIENDS

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. realize that Jesus' friends were happy whenever He visited them

b welcome visitors

BACKGROUND:

Bethany was a small town about 3 kilometres from Jerusalem. Jesus had special friends in this town ... Martha, Mary and their brother Lazarus. The Gospels seem to say that Jesus often visited this family and stayed at their house. Probably He slept there during the last week of His life.

St Luke tells about one of Jesus' visits to Martha's home. (Lk 10:38-42). Both Martha and Mary were very happy to see Jesus and made Him very welcome. Jesus appreciated the welcome they gave Him and enjoyed the food and rest He received at their house. On this visit, Jesus took the opportunity to teach the same lesson He had taught so many times before, namely that it is important for us all to be busy about the things of heaven.

REFLECTION:

What would I do if Jesus came to my house?

PREPARE:

Introduction to Scripture: Study the Background notes above.

Scripture: Jesus Visits Martha and Mary, Lk 10:38-42 p.251 (Tell in your own words)

Story: Make up a simple story about a visit to a friend's place stressing the welcome, the friendship and happiness of the visit.



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children describe how they feel when friends come to visit them.

How do you welcome friends and make them feel happy?

Story: A Visit

Children share in the happiness of the visit. They notice how the visitor was welcomed.

Introduction to the Living Word:

The children are prepared for the story, Jesus Visits Martha and Mary.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: Jesus visits Martha and Mary, Lk 10:38-42

Children appreciate the welcome Jesus was given and how He must have enjoyed everything that Martha and Mary did for Him.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

What did Martha do for Jesus? What did Mary do to make Jesus happy?

Consider: Jesus is happy when you welcome your friends and make them feel happy. He remembers how Martha and Mary welcomed Him and He wants you to do the same for your friends.

Prayer: Jesus, please help us to be kind and friendly to visitors. Help us to make them welcome and show them that we love them.

Mime or Drama: Welcoming a friend.

Children become familiar with the names: Martha, Mary, Bethany, Jerusalem.

Children act the story.

Draw Jesus eating food at Martha's house.

Teacher and children pray.

FOR MY LIFE: I will invite a friend to visit me and prepare a nice welcome.

JESUS BLESSED LITTLE CHILDREN

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. be able to tell the story, Jesus blesses little children

b. ask Jesus to bless them and their little brothers and sisters

BACKGROUND:

God is the only one who can bless. He is the only one who can make our lives better and give us peace of mind. When we say: "May God bless you" we are really wishing or praying that God will do good things for the person ... make his/her life successful and happy. In the Bible there are many references to God blessing a person, his children, his house, his animals etc. Some good always comes from the blessing. To say: "Blessed be God" is a way of thanking God and expressing admiration for something He has done.

Many Catholics have the custom of saying: "May God bless you" when they meet each other and when they say Goodbye.

When Jesus blessed the little children, He did something good for them, something that only God could do.

REFLECTION:

Do I ever use the expression: "May God bless you"?

PREPARE:

Scripture: Jesus Blesses Little Children, Lk 18:15-16
Picture: Jesus Blesses Little Children. Page 259

Song: A blessing song

May the blessing of God be upon you! The blessing of the Father and the Son!. And may the Spirit of God, the Spirit of love be with you all your days.

UNIT 11: JESUS TEACHES US MANY THINGS

FOR THE TEACHER

UNIT 11.82

JESUS TEACHES US TO THINK ABOUT GOD

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. learn to think of God

b. talk to each other about God

BACKGROUND:

The Old Testament covers the span of time stretching from the Creation of the World to the Birth of Christ. The New Testament covers the time span from the Birth of Christ to His Second Coming. From first to last. Christ is the central figure in all the books of the Bible. "When the right time finally came, God sent his own Son. He came as the son of a human mother and lived under the Jewish Law to redeem those who were under the Law so that we might become God's sons," Gal 4:4-5. The Mystery of God's coming into the world is called the Mystery of the Incarnation which means the mystery of God-in-the-flesh. The Bible writers all focused on this Mystery and explained it in terms of God's love for the human family, in terms of freedom from sin. "Freedom is what you have - Christ has set us free! Stand, then as free people, and do not allow yourselves to become slaves again," Gal 5:1. Through prayerful reading of the Bible, people grow in appreciation of the Mystery of the Incarnation and in the knowledge of God's love until, as St Paul says, they become "completely filled with the very nature of God," Eph 3:19b.

REFLECTION: Do I try to appreciate God's love for me?

PREPARE:

Scripture: "Look at the birds ... your Father in heaven takes care

of them! ... Look how the wild flowers grow ... it is God

who makes them beautiful." Mt 6:25-34.

Drawings: Birds / Flowers

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children name birds and flowers they see on their way to school.

Do you stop to look at them? Do you talk about them to each other?

Shut your eyes now: can you "see" these birds and flowers in your mind?

Consider: Jesus often walked from one place to another. As He walked along, He saw many different kinds of birds and flowers. He looked at them and thought how beautiful they were and He talked about them to others.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: "Look at the birds ... your Father in heaven takes care of them! Look how the wild flowers grow ... it is God who makes them beautiful," Mt 6:25-34.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

What did Jesus say about the birds and flowers? Who was He thinking about?

Consider: The lovely things you see help you to think of God. He made them and He looks after them. When you see how good and caring God is, it is easy for you to trust in Him.

Prayer: God our Father, open our eyes to see the lovely things around us. Help us to think of you and trust you.

Sharing: Children experience talking together about God.

Children draw a bird or flower they saw on the way to school.

Teacher: Display the **Drawings** of birds etc. Children admire them.

Teacher and children pray.

Children go our in twos to look at the birds and flowers. Talk about God.

FOR MY LIFE: Sometimes, I will talk about God to my friends.

JESUS TEACHES US TO PRAY TO GOD

The children will -**OBJECTIVES:**

a. realize that it is important to pray

b. develop the practice of saying morning prayer

BACKGROUND:

Today, we have many educated people in our country and, with radio and television, we have many opportunities to hear what they have to say. It is good to listen to such people and to reflect on their ideas. But still, it is much more important for us to listen to what Jesus has to say and to reflect on His ideas. By reading the New Testament, we can become familiar with these. In his Gospel, St Matthew has set out Jesus' ideas about prayer. Jesus says that prayer is nothing to make a show about. "... go to your room, close the door, and pray to your Father, who is unseen. And your Father, who sees what you do in private, will reward you." Mt 6:6

REFLECTION:


Do I spend time, in private, with God my Father?

BACKGROUND:

An obedient person does what he/she is told to do, willingly. Many people find it hard to obey because they like to assert themselves. They think they know better than others. It is "beneath" them to take orders. It is very touching to reflect on what St Paul said in praise of Jesus: "He was humble and walked the path of obedience all the way to death - his death on the cross," Phil 2:8. As a young boy in his home village of Nazareth, Jesus was recognized as an obedient child. He was obedient to his parents. Ref Lk 2:51. It was this special quality of obedience that enabled Jesus to carry out the Work of Salvation.

REFLECTION:

Am I an obedient person?

PREPARE:


Scripture: Jesus was obedient to his parents. Ref Lk 2:51

Prayer: Jesus, thank you for teaching me that God wants me to be obedient. Help me to obey my parents and teachers.

Children think of times when they were obedient / disobedient.

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Draw Jesus doing something His mother told Him to do.

Children read the words on the poster.

Teacher and children pray

FOR MY LIFE: I will do whatever my parents and teachers tell me.

JESUS TEACHES US TO BE KIND

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. understand what it means to be kind

b. want to practice kindness at home and at school

BACKGROUND:

A kind person is someone who is gentle and considerate in dealing with other people. Starting with the example of Jesus Himself, the New Testament promotes kindness. The early Christians were taught to be kind and tender-hearted towards each other. The story of The Good Samaritan (Lk 10:30-35) is ranked as one of the greatest stories ever written. The Good Samaritan is the perfect model of kindness. His heart prompted him to do all he could to help someone in difficulties. He never counted the cost to himself in terms of risk or time or money.

REFLECTION: Am I kind to the children I teach?

PREPARE:

Scripture: Many people came to Jesus because He was kind to

everyone. Ref Lk 4:40

Scripture: The Story of the Good Samaritan, Lk 10:30-35 (Tell the

Story in your words)

Story: A KIND SISTER

One morning as Maggie and Nick were getting ready for school, Maggie noticed that her brother Nick was crying. He seemed to be very upset and worried. Suddenly, Maggie realized that Nick had lost his pencils! "Nick, I've got three pencils. You can have one of mine today and, after school, we'll look for yours." Nick felt much better now. They went off to school together and had a very nice day.

UNIT 12

WHEN WE PRAY WE TALK TO GOD

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. become aware that when they pray, they speak to God

b. want to pray often

BACKGROUND:

When we pray, we speak to God. Many of the Old Testament prayers help us to appreciate this. Even in his anger, Jonah knew that he was speaking to God. "Lord, didn't I say before I left home that this is just what you would do? That's why I did my best to run away to Spain! I knew that you are a loving and merciful God, always patient, always kind, and always ready to change your mind and not punish." Ref Jonah 4.

Many of Job's prayers are quite shocking! In his prayer, he blamed God for his sufferings and told Him that He was most unfair. "Are you harmed by my sin? Why use me for target practice? Am I so great a burden to you? Can't you ever forgive my sin? Can't you pardon the wrong I do? Soon I'll be in the grave, and I'll be gone when you look for me." Job 7:20-21.

The prayer Jesus taught us is not a stormy one like Job's, but still it is addressed to God. "This then is how you should pray: Our Father...," Mt 6:9-13.

PREPARE:

Scripture: "..pray to your Father in heaven." Mt 6:6b

Picture: Jesus praying. Page 261

Poster: Father in Heaven, I give you today

All that I think and do and say. (say / sing)

Song: Father in Heaven...page 142

Story: ESTHER TALKS TO HER FATHER

Esther is very fond of her father and likes to sit close to him at night. She talks to him about everything that happened during the day. He listens carefully to her and she feels that she is very special to him. When he notices her getting sleepy, he says, "Esther, we've had a nice talk now so let's talk to God our Father before we go to bed. They say thank you to God for looking after them and making them happy... then they go to bed.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Prayer experience: Teacher leads the children in prayer

FOR MY LIFE: I will say the Morning Offering every day.

Children sit quietly in the presence of God.

Children discuss: What I can talk to God about.

Read / sing the prayer on the poster.

Children pray quietly.

WE PRAY EVERYDAY

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. realize that prayer is part of daily life

b. say Morning Prayers (Morning Offering, Lesson 86)

BACKGROUND:

The Bible has many examples of God's people trying to control their lives by their own efforts. In the Garden of Eden, our First Parents expressed their desire to be independent of God. On a plain in Babylonia, the people of the whole world gathered to demonstrate their independence of God. They intended to build a tower reaching to the sky; they wanted to go up and be on God's level.

In the hope of getting what they wanted, without having to depend on God, many in Israel worshipped the gods of neighboring peoples. Most of Israel's kings put their trust in political skill and bribery. For all their trouble, they ended as slaves of the Babylonians.

It is easy for us to see ourselves in the people of the Bible. We have this same tendency to try to get along without God. We put our trust in such things as money, science, education, magic, etc. How much better it would be, if we were to put our trust in God.


REFLECTION: "Your Father in heaven will give good things to those who ask him," Mt 7:11b.

PREPARE:

Scripture: God's people prayed everyday. Ref Acts 2:46-47

Flash cards: Morning / Night / Meal-time

Song: Morning Offering song page 142



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children share: When do we talk to our parents.

They discover that they talk to them anytime, (e.g. while they are working; walking etc) but they also have special times when they talk to them. They identify the special times.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: God's people prayed everyday. Ref Ac 2:46-47.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

At what special times in the day, do you think God's people prayed?

Consider: God's people loved God and liked to pray. They gathered at special times for prayer, but they prayed any time, whenever they could.

Flash cards: Morning / Night / Meal-time

Children understand that there are special times for praying e.g. morning, evening, meal-time.

Prayer: God our Father, You are with us always. Look after us and teach us to pray.

List 'special' times e.g. morning, night, at meal-time

Children draw themselves praying.

Children suggest special times for praying.

Mime: Getting up / Going to bed.

Children pray.

FOR MY LIFE: I will pray in the morning, in the evening and at meal-time.



OUR PARENTS AND TEACHERS PRAY

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. realize that their parents and teachers pray

b. be happy to pray with their parents and teachers

BACKGROUND:

On the night he was arrested and brought to trial, Jesus was praying in the Garden of Olives. Judas knew exactly where to find him because he knew that Jesus usually went there to pray; he must have seen him praying there; he knew that Jesus prayed.

A "disciple" is a person who follows the teaching and way of life of someone he/she accepts as a leader. The Apostles, who had accepted Jesus as their leader, had the experience of watching him at prayer. On one occasion, they were prompted to ask him to teach them how to pray. The instruction He gave is set out in St Matthew's Gospel, Chapter 6:5-14.

REFLECTION: Do the children ever see me praying?

PREPARE:

Scripture: "When Jesus had finished, one of his (friends) said to him,

"teach us to pray ... " Lk 11:1

Picture: Jesus praying. Page 261

Story: THE LUCKY TWINS

Imelda and Antonia are lucky twins. They live with their mother and father in Tasau village near a beautiful river. Every morning and evening, Imelda and Antonia see their mother and father praying. Their mother says, "Let's say our prayers, now". And they all kneel down together to pray. They make the Sign of the Cross and then speak to God about many things. They often say "Thank you" to God for being so good to their family.

Story: MRS MESASA

Mrs Mesasa teaches in Prep. The children like her very much; they called her Mrs Mes for short. Every morning they come early to help Mrs Mes to get ready for school. She likes them to bring flowers for the altar and to keep it clean. Before class, Mrs Mes always stands near the altar to pray. She joins her hands and closes her eyes. The children are happy to see her praying!

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children show how they pray ... join their hands, kneel or sit quietly, close their eyes ... **Story**: The Lucky Twins

Children appreciate that the twins are lucky because they see their parents praying.

Story: Mrs Mesasa

Children appreciate that the Prep children are lucky because they see their teacher praying every morning.

Have you ever watched your parents praying? How did you feel when you saw them praying?

Pictures: Parents / teacher praying.

Children feel that it is good to watch their parents / teacher praying.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Picture: Jesus praying

Jesus' friends were very happy to watch him praying. They saw that He looked different.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

When Jesus' friends saw Him praying, they wanted to pray, too. They asked Jesus to teach them to pray.

Consider: Would you like to pray as Jesus as His friends did? You can ask Jesus to teach you to pray.

Prayer: Teacher, gather the children around the altar, prepare them for prayer and lead them in prayer.

FOR MY LIFE: I will often say the prayer, Jesus teach me to pray.

Dramatize the story.

Decorate the classroom altar.

TO WHEEL TO

Children learn the prayer, Jesus teach me to pray.

Children pray.

OUR COMMUNITY PRAYS

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. become aware that it is important to pray with others

b. join in community prayer

BACKGROUND:

Good example prompts us to try to do better. "Example is better than preaching" and "Practise what you preach" are two common sayings. It is easy to remember someone who helped you by good example. Parents and community leaders are concerned about the young people. They hope that they will learn good community values and hand them on to the next generation. Everyone knows that young people respond well to good example. In the matter of community prayer, it is not enough to send children to church. In the Holy Family, the parents took the Divine Child with them to the Temple to take part in community prayer. Ref Lk 2:41-52.

REFLECTION:

In the matter of community prayer, do I teach by example?

PREPARE:

Scripture: Lk 2:41-52 (Tell in your own words. Stress: Jesus

prayed with others.)

Picture: A Church Scene. Page 246

Poster: Let us pray

Story: RUTH GOES TO CHURCH

Ruth is a very lucky little girl because her parents take her with them wherever they go. When she was a small baby, her mother would dress her nicely for Mass, put her in a bilum and carry her to the church. Soon, she learned to peep out through the holes in the bilum. She liked looking at the people in the church and listening to them singing. When she was older, she walked to church with her family. She loved looking at all the people in the church and she often joined in when they sang and prayed. Ruth always felt very happy in the church praying and singing with others.

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children talk about going to Mass. How do you prepare for Mass? Who do they meet on the way? What do the people do in the church?

Story: Ruth goes to Church

Children notice that Ruth's parents took her to church; she was happy to be in the church listening to people praying and singing.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: The Boy Jesus in the Temple, Lk 2:41-52 (in your own words)

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Why did Jesus go to the Temple?

From the example of Jesus, children understand that it is important to pray with others.

Picture: A Church Scene

Children see that there are many people praying together. They feel that it is good to pray with their community.

Consider: The words on the Poster: Let us pray.

God wants us to pray with our community, just as Jesus did.

Praying together:

Gather the children around the altar. Invite them to pray (sing) together.

FOR MY LIFE: I will go to Mass on Sundays.

Children draw themselves ready for Mass.

Children discuss the story:

Children discuss the picture.

Children read the words on the poster.

Children join hands and say: Our Father

THINGS IN THE CHURCH HELP US TO PRAY

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. become familiar with things in the Church that help them to pray

b. feel that these are sacred things

BACKGROUND:

The Book of Leviticus, the third book in the Bible, contains rules for worship and religious ceremonies. Perhaps it is not such an interesting book to read, but it is important, none-the-less, because it stresses the holiness of God and the importance of having rules for public worship. When public worship is carried out in a fitting way, it unites and strengthens the faith of the community.

REFLECTION:

'You, Lord, have placed the sun in the sky, yet we build places for you to live in.' Ref 1 Kg 8:12

PREPARE:

A Visit to the Church or the Story, Anne Visits the Church

Chart with simple drawings (use this with the story):- altar, lectern, crucifix, tabernacle

Song: Teacher's choice.

Story: ANNE VISITS THE CHURCH

One afternoon, Anne asked her father to come for a walk to the Church. He was very happy to go along and off they went. As they came near the church, Anne was surprised to see how big it looked. "It has to be big," said her father. "It's God's house and His family come here to pray together, especially on Sundays.

Then they went inside. First, they knelt down to pray. When they had finished their prayer, they walked around to look at the things in the church. Anne went and stood near the altar.

"That's the altar," her father said, "it's a very holy thing. You see it is like a table. People come to this table for special Food." And what's this? Anne asked, standing near the **lectern**. "That's for the Bible. God, our Father speaks to His Family from the Bible." Anne thought, what a nice way for God to speak to us!

Anne saw her father bow his head as He came near the big **Crucifix**. "Look at that, Anne? I think you know what it is! he said. "Yes, Papa. That's a **crucifix**. It tells us that God loves us." Anne's father said, "Let's go now and kneel in front of the **Tabernacle**. Let's go close to where Jesus is. We can say Good Night to Him before we go home."

LOOKING AT LIFE:

If possible, make a visit to the church. Children tidy themselves. Pray / sing as they go to the church. They are happy to be going to God's house.

OF

Children close their eyes and picturé their Parish Church continue with the **story**, Anne Visits the Church.

Children understand that a visit to the church is a special kind of visit.

They become familiar with things in the church that help them to pray.

They realize that these are holy things.

Sharing the Visit:

Children become more familiar with the things in the church. They are able to name them; they realize that they are important because they help them to pray.

Prayer / Song: Teacher's choice

Children pray and sing as they would, if they were visiting the church.



A PRAYER SERVICE

PREPARE:

A suitable place for prayer e.g. church / class-room Children help to prepare and decorate an altar **Scripture:** 1 Ti 2:8-9; Eph 6:18; Mt 7:7-11

Songs:

Any suitable-songs

Food:

peanuts / twisties (a sign of celebration)

TEACHER: Gather the children around the altar and settle them quietly for prayer.

We are gathered here today to pray to God our Father. The Bible tells us to lift up our hearts to God at all times and to speak to Him in prayer.

CHILDREN: Sing: (Song chosen by the teacher)

TEACHER: When we love someone, we like to spend time with that person and talk to

him/her. That is what prayer is: it is spending time with God and talking to Him because we love Him. Today, let us show God that we love Him and

want to spend time with Him and talk to Him about many things.

Pray at times; never get tired of praying to God. Ref 1 Ti 2:8-9.

CHILDREN: Sing: (Song chosen by the teacher)

TEACHER: First Reading is from the New Testament, Eph 6:18.

"Pray all the time asking God for what you need." This is the Word of the

Lord. (Thanks be to God)

TEACHER: Let us pray that God will bless our class:

CHILDREN: Response ... God our Father hear our prayer

TEACHER: Let us pray for our parents, brothers and sisters that God will bless them

and make them happy

CHILDREN: Response: God our Father hear our prayer.

TEACHER: Let us pray for all the children in our school that God will bless them and

help them to be kind.

CHILDREN: Response: God our Father hear our prayer.

TEACHER: (Adapted from Mt 7:7-11) Jesus says, pray to God and ask him for

everything you need. Trust Him because He is good and loves you

very much.

This is the Good News of Jesus Christ.

INSTRUCTION: Teacher gives the children a short instruction.

Invite the children to show that they are happy when they pray to God.

Let us pray to God our Father:

TOGETHER: (Children repeat after the teacher)

God our Father we thank you for looking after us.

God our Father, we ask you to give us everything we need.



MARY'S BIRTHDAY

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. become aware that Mary's birthday is celebrated on the 8th September

b. celebrate Mary's birthday

BACKGROUND:

In Hebrew, the name Mary (Miriam) probably meant "beloved". Moses' sister, who was named Mary, was with Moses when God set the people of Israel free from slavery in Egypt. In the New Testament, Mary, 'beloved of God' was with Jesus, the new Moses, at the moment God set the human family free from slavery to sin. Mary is necessary in Salvation. Welcome her. Celebrate Salvation with her today.

ΡΕΦΛΕΧΤΙΟΝ:

What place does Mary have in my life?

PREPARE:

Scripture: God chose Mary to be the mother of His Son. (Ref Lk 1:26)

Poster: Write on it the names "Anne and Joachim" and paste a

picture of a baby on it. Write "Mary" near the baby. Decorate

the poster.

Classroom Altar: Statue or picture of Mary. Candles and flowers for

decoration. Words, "Happy birthday to you."

Story: A SPECIAL BABY

Anna and Joachim had been married for a long time, but they had no children. Everyday, they prayed that God would give them a baby. And God heard their prayer. One year, on the 8th of September Anna gave birth to a beautiful baby girl. People used to say: "What a lovely baby. She's special!"

Anna wrapped her up carefully and placed her on the little bed Joachim had prepared. Her parents called her "Mary" because they knew that everyone would love her.

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children talk about their birthdays. Do they celebrate their birthday? Why are birthdays important?

Consider how new babies are welcomed by their families.

Story: A Special Baby

Children appreciate that the baby, Mary was a special gift from God.

Poster:

Children share the happiness that the new baby, Mary brought to her parents.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: God chose Mary to be the mother of His Son. Ref Lk 1:26.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

What special work did God have for Mary?

Consider: God knows every baby in the world. He hopes that they will always be good and happy. He has special work for them to do, just as He had for Mary. When Mary grew up, she became the mother of God's Son, Jesus.

Prayer to welcome Mary:

Children gather around the altar to express their happiness at the birth of Mary and to welcome this "special" baby.

Children share their memories of new-babies.

Who were Mary's parents?
When is Mary's birthday?
Celebrate it

Display the poster. Talk about it.

Draw Baby Mary asleep on her little bed.

Children say: Hail Mary ... Sing: Happy Birthday

FOR MY LIFE: I will ask my family to celebrate Mary's birthday on 8th September.

MARY VISITS ELIZABETH

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. be able to tell the story, Mary Visits Elizabeth

b. be happy to help others as Mary did

BACKGROUND:

Sometimes people express their joy and gladness through dancing. When King David brought the Ark of the Covenant to Jerusalem, he danced for joy because he knew that God was coming into His Holy City, 2 Sm 6.16. In the story, Mary Visits Elizabeth, Lk 1:39-45, the unborn baby John 'danced' for joy at the sound of Mary's voice. Mary was like the holy Ark of God carrying the Redeemer of the World. The baby's 'dance' is a sign that a time of joy and gladness has come: God is present in the world in a new way, for a new work!

REFLECTION: Do I recognize God's presence in my life?

PREPARE:

Scripture: MARY VISITS ELIZABETH (Ref Lk 1:39-56)


When Mary heard the news that her cousin, Elizabeth was going to have a baby, she decided to go and stay with her to help her with the washing and cooking. It was quite a long way from Mary's place, but off she went and at last she came to Elizabeth's house.

Elizabeth was so happy to see Mary. She gave her a big welcome and thanked her for coming. Mary helped Elizabeth and after her little baby John was born, Mary went back home.

Prayer: Hail Mary Jesus.



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children share their experience of visiting someone they like. Who do you like to visit? Why do you visit? How do your friends welcome you?

Children realize that it is important to visit their friends and to help them.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: Mary Visits Elizabeth, Ref Lk 1:39-56.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Why did Mary visit Elizabeth?

Children realize that Mary thought about Elizabeth and wanted to help her. Her visit made Elizabeth very happy.

Picture: Mary Visits Elizabeth

Consider: Children admire Mary for going to visit Elizabeth to help her. They realize that they can help others just as Mary did.

Prayer: Hail Mary

Children share the happiness of Mary's visit and ask her to help them to think of others.

FOR MY LIFE: I will visit and take for him / her.

Children draw themselves going to their friend's house.

Retell / dramatize the Story:

Children suggest what Mary did for Elizabeth.

Ghildren draw (use plasticine) letters "M"/"E"

Children say the Hail Mary

MARY HELPED JESUS

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. hear that Mary helped Jesus because she loved him

b. want Mary to love and help them

BACKGROUND:

Naturally, Mary has an important place in the childhood of Jesus, but the Gospel also tells us that she had an important place in His public life, e.g. at the Wedding in Cana, Jn 2:1-11. She travelled around Galilee with women who provided for Jesus and His apostles. Once, Jesus praised her in public; He called her "blessed" because she always did what God wanted her to do. And at the end of Jesus' life, Mary was at the foot of the Cross still taking part in His saving work and comforting Him.

REFLECTION: Do I want to share in Mary's love?

PREPARE:

Scripture: MARY HELPED JESUS (adapted from Lk 2)

It was very cold in Bethlehem on the night Jesus was born and so Mary wrapped him up very carefully in a little blanket to keep him warm. Whenever he was hungry, she fed him and, when he was tired, she put him to sleep on his little bed. All day long, Mary looked after him; she always talked nicely to him and helped him.


Mary taught Jesus to walk and to talk. He loved to hear stories 'from before' so Mary told him many stories.

Children appreciate that Mary is a mother; she is always ready to help them, just as she helped Jesus.

Children will want to be loved and helped by Mary.

FOR MY LIFE: I will ask Mary to help me.

Draw Mama cooking / washing

Children discuss the picture.

Children name things that Mary did for Jesus.

Children write their names and paste them on the poster.

Chidlren sing.

MARY HELPS EVERYONE

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. be able to tell the Story the Wedding in Cana

b. feel that they can always ask Mary to help them

BACKGROUND:

Mary shared in Jesus' work of bringing new life to the human family. Now, in Heaven, she continues to bring salvation by her prayers. Because she is our Mother, she has a mother's love for us. She knows that we are still on earth, still hoping to reach our home in heaven. She is sorry for us when we are worried or lost and she will not leave us until we are safely in heaven.

REFLECTION:

How kind Mary was to the young couple on their wedding day! (Ref Jn 2:1-11)

PREPARE:

Scripture: The Wedding at Cana. Ref Jn 2:1-11

Classroom altar: in honour of Mary Song: Hail Mary, page 273

Story: MARY GOES TO A WEDDING (Ref Jn 2:1-11)

One day, Mary and her friends went to a wedding feast at a little town called Cana. Jesus and many of his friends went along, too. Everyone was having a good time and then, suddenly, Mary noticed something. She noticed that there was nothing left to drink. How sad it would be, she thought, if this young couple was ashamed on their wedding day. So she went quietly to Jesus and whispered, 'There is nothing left to drink. Everything is finished.' When Jesus heard this, he did something very special for the young couple. He changed water into wine and the feast went on happily again!

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children share their experience of weddings.

What happened at the wedding?

How did the families do?

Children realize that a wedding is a special celebration and everyone wants to be happy. God likes us to dance and sing and celebrate weddings with nice food and drink.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: Mary Goes to a Wedding (Based on Jn 2:1-11)

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Who did Mary think of at the wedding?

Children realize that Mary wanted to help the young couple on their wedding day. She wanted them to be happy and enjoy their feast.

Consider: Mary cares about everyone. She thinks about you and wants you to be happy always. When she sees that you need something, she goes to Jesus for you. You can share everything you do with Mary.

Prayer: Children experience that it is good to pray and sing to Mary.


FOR MY LIFE: I will often ask Mary to help me.

MARY WAS TAKEN INTO HEAVEN

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. be able to say that Mary was taken up into Heaven

b. want to go to Heaven when they die

BACKGROUND:

Mary our Mother shared in all the mysteries of Jesus' life and death. Her Assumption into Heaven is a sign of her special share in the Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus. God honoured Mary by taking her into Heaven after her death. In Heaven, she enjoys special honour and, from her place in Heaven, she intercedes for us and waits for us to finish our lives here on earth. She loves us and helps us to live in God's love. She is attentive to our prayers.

REFLECTION: Do I ever think of Heaven? Do I desire to go there?

PREPARE:

Pictures: Mary and the child Jesus / Mary at the Cross.

Song: Any suitable song to Mary

Flash card: Congratulations, Mary

Classroom Altar: Decorate

Life Story: Mary's life-story (see Outline)

Flash card: Children congratulate Mary because she was honoured by God.

MARY'S LIFE STORY: Children listen to Mary's life-story.

Mary's birthday is celebrated on the 8th Sept-ember. Her parents were Joachim and Anna. She grew up in a small village called Nazareth. Everybody loved Mary and God had a special love for her. He wanted her to be the mother of His Son, Jesus.

Mary gave birth to God's Son at Bethlehem and looked after him and taught Him many things.

When Jesus was grown-up, Mary helped Him with His work of teaching and she went with Him to His death on the Cross. She stood near Him to comfort Him.

PALM SUNDAY

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. be able to tell the story of Palm Sunday

b. want to take part in the Palm Sunday celebration

BACKGROUND:

About 1,000 years before Jesus was born, King Solomon rode on a donkey to his coronation ceremony which took place on the eastern slope of Mt Zion, the hill on which Jerusalem is built. Riding on a donkey was the sign that Jesus chose to tell the people of Jerusalem that now their King and Saviour is coming to them. They responded with the cry "Hosanna" which, in Jesus' language (Aramaic) means "save us."

REFLECTION:

The mysteries of Salvation are made present in the Liturgy. Am I aware of participating in them?

PREPARE:

Scripture: The Story of Palm Sunday (See Mk 11:1-11)

Story: JESUS RIDES ON A DONKEY

One morning, the people of Jerusalem saw Jesus dressed in his very best clothes, riding on a donkey and coming towards their city. Everyone hurried to meet him. As he came towards the city, the crowd got bigger and bigger. The people, and the children, too, were all very excited. Some started breaking branches off the trees and waving them and calling out a lovely word, "Hosanna". Some spread their clothes on the road in front of Jesus. And the little donkey stepped on them very carefully. He was not a bit frightened with all the noise and excitement; he enjoyed carrying Jesus into Jerusalem!

LOOKING AT LIFE:

The children hear the story of Jesus' Entry into Jerusalem and share in the excitement of this event.

FOR MY LIFE:

I will remind my family about Palm Sunday and help to prepare our palms.

EASTER SUNDAY

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. become aware that Jesus was dead and came back to life on Easter Sunday

b. celebrate Easter Sunday at their parish church

BACKGROUND:

The four Gospel writers have written about the Resurrection of Jesus from the dead and they have told many stories about it. In 1 Corinthians, St Paul has written a whole chapter, Chapter 15 on the importance of the Mystery of the Resurrection. This is verse 14, "If Christ has not been raised from death, then we have nothing to preach and you have nothing to believe."

REFLECTION:

In his great mercy, God gave us new life by raising Jesus Christ from death. This fills us with hope and so we can look forward to possessing the rich blessings of heaven. Alleluia! (Missal.)

PREPARE:

Scripture: The Resurrection, Lk 24:1-11

Story: EASTER SUNDAY MORNING (adapted, Lk 24:1-11)

Very early on Easter Sunday morning, some women went to the cave in which Jesus' friends had buried His body (on Good Friday) after they had taken it down from the Cross. They were carrying some nice perfume for Jesus' body.

When they reached the cave, they got a very big surprise. The heavy stone at the door of the cave had been rolled away and Jesus was gone! Then they heard the good news that He was alive.

MICHAEL, THE ARCHANGEL

BACKGROUND:

Angels are part of God's creation. They are spiritual beings who glorify God and help human beings on their way to Heaven.

Michael is one of the great angels known to the people of the Bible. His name means "who is like God". When Satan challenged God and refused to serve Him, Michael was loyal. In the Book of Daniel, Michael is called

the "great prince who stands over your (God's) people," Dn 12.1. In the New Testament, there are two references to the Angel Michael, Jude 9 and Rev 12:7. Rev 12:7 depicts Michael as the leader of the angelic army in the battle between the dragon (Satan) and his angels (evil spirits). In Christian worship, Michael is the protector of the Church and the angel who leads the souls of the departed into heaven. The Church in P.N.G.

has appointed him Patron of this country.

REFLECTION: Do I trust God's angels to take care of me?

PREPARE:

Scripture: MICHAEL, THE GOOD SPIRIT (Ref Dan 10:1f)

Long ago, God gave His people a good spirit called Michael to protect them. They were very happy then because they knew that Michael was good and strong, and that bad spirits were afraid of him.

He is God; He existed before the world was created and now He comes as the source of life bringing light to the whole human family. He is born of the Virgin Mary at Bethlehem.

The name Emmanuel which means "God is with us" was first used by the Prophet Isaiah, Is 7:10-17. The child who receives this title is given by God as a sign of peace for Israel. St Matthew has this text in mind when he tells the story of the Birth of Jesus. The title "Immanuel" is entirely appropriate for Jesus because He is God and the Sign of Peace for the human family.





The New Testament also gives angels a place in the story of Salvation. In the stories about the conception and birth of Jesus, there are several references to them. The Angel Gabriel brings God's message to Mary announcing the Birth of Jesus. An angel tells Joseph about the mystery of the Child's conception and warns him about King Herod's evil plan. An angel of the Lord brings God's message of peace to the Shepherds and a great army of Heaven's angels sing "Glory to God" on the night of Jesus' birth.

Modern Christians believe that angels are heavenly spirits. By studying all that has been said about them in the Bible and in the Tradition of the Church, they try to discover more about these wonderful beings.





Being kings themselves, they understood the importance of welcoming the new King, Christ the Lord.



Joseph built a nice house for his family in a village called Nazareth. When he married Mary, he brought her to his house and, together, they made a happy home for the Child Jesus.

The Child Jesus had to learn many things. As a baby, he had to learn to talk and walk and use a spoon. His mother taught him how to be helpful at home and gave him many little jobs to do like getting firewood and watering the garden.

He watched his mother making bread and sweeping around the house and fixing the lamp. Sometimes, he'd go to his father's workshop and watch him making tables and beds.

Teacher: Mary and Joseph set off for Bethlehem. Many people had already arrived there and the little town was soon overcrowded. Joseph went around looking for a place to stay, but every room was taken up.

Joseph: (knocking on a door) Please, have you any room for us? My wife is going to have a baby soon.

inn-keeper: O sorry! We have no room here.

Joseph: (knocking on another door) Please, could we stay here just for tonight. Mary is going to have her baby, soon. It's very cold outside.

Inn-keeper: O Sorry. We have no room.

Joseph: (tries another house) O please, could we stay here at your house just for tonight. My wife needs a place to have her baby. It's so cold outside.

Inn-keeper: O sorry! I have no room, but I know a place where you could stay, if you don't mind. See that old shed down there. You can go there.

Teacher: Joseph cleaned the shed and lit a fire to keep Mary warm.

And that's where Baby Jesus was born. She wrapped him up nicely in a blanket and put him to sleep in the animals' food box.

WE THANK OUR FATHERS (Fathers' Day)

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. realize that fathers are very important in families

b. thank their fathers and pray for them

BACKGROUND:

Thanks to special studies done over the last 10-20 years, there is evidence that fathers and mothers do the work of "parenting" in complementary ways. The most important time for the father begins when his child starts to interact with the world. A father makes his special contribution to a child's development by helping it to explore the world outside the family, by helping it to discipline itself and by teaching it skills for life. This is how a father helps his child to grow in self-respect.

REFLECTION:

"When you are in trouble, the Lord will remember your kindness (to your father) and will help you; your sins will melt away like frost in warm sunshine," Sir 3:14-15.

PREPARE:

Scripture: LOVE YOUR FATHERS (Ex 20:12)

In a country far away, there is a mountain called Sinai. God came down on this mountain to speak to His people and tell them how to live happily together. He said: 'You must respect your fathers and be good to them always and especially when they are old and sick.' And God promised that He would bless children who are good to their fathers.

Picture: A Family Picture. Page 244

Activity card for each child: Trace in big letters, Thank you, Papa.

Altar: Clean and decorate the classroom altar

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children share: What my father does for me. What I do for my father.

Children realize that their fathers are very important to them. They show their love by doing things for their families.

Children talk about what their fathers do; they realize that fathers do many things for their families because they love them.

Consider: God has given fathers the special work of looking after their families. He helps them to take care of their families.

I will take home my Card and give it to my father and wish him a happy day.

Activity cards: Trace and decorate.

Teacher: Let us ask God to bless our fathers...

Response: God, please bless my father.

WE LOVE OUR COUNTRY

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. realize that God has blessed them with a beautiful country

b. want to look after their country, P.N.G.

BACKGROUND:

The first Catholic missionaries arrived in 1882. They landed at Matupit Island in New Britain and realized that God had brought them to a very beautiful country. He had already prepared many people to welcome them and to accept their message. Soon, they began to hear that God loved them and wanted them to have the gift of eternal life. Then they began to live in a new way ... the way of love and forgiveness. "Be kind and tenderhearted to one another, and forgive one another" Eph 4:32.

REFLECTION:

My country is a gift to me. How does God expect me to act in this beautiful country?

PREPARE:

National Flag / National Emblem Pictures: Birds / flowers / etc

Story: OUR COUNTRY

God has given us a very beautiful country. And, He has put many different kinds of people in it, too. Each tribe is "special"; it has its own customs and language.

In our country, there are big forests full of lovely trees and birds and animals. And there are rivers and lakes and mountains where wonderful things are hidden away.

Our people know how to do many things. They can paint pictures, make music, teach, and nurse the sick. Some can drive trucks and even fly aeroplanes.

There are lots of things to be done in our country.

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children talk about the national flag.
What are its colours?
How do you show that your flag is important?

Children realize that the Flag is our flag; it stands for ourr country, P.N.G.

Story: Our Country

Children hear about our country and realize that it is a very beautiful country.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Who gave us this beautiful country?

Consider: God knows our country and loves it. He gave us our country and wants us to be healthy and happy here in P.N.G. He wants us to work together and help one another in every way we can.

Prayer: Let us pray for our country:

Children express their love for their country through prayer and song

Ceremony: Honour the flag and sing the National Song.

FOR MY LIFE: I will be a good child of my country.

Children draw the Flag of P.N.G.

Children look at the pictures. Name other things in P.N.G. that they like.

Share: How can we show that we love our country?

Teacher and children pray.

Children salute the flag and sing.



WE RESPECT GOD'S WORK (World Environment Day)

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. become aware that all of nature is a gift from God

b. respect God's work in nature

BACKGROUND:

Only after they have thought carefully about the works of the Lord, (Creation and Salvation), do the people of the Bible use the expression "Praise the Lord". This is their expression of admiration and wonder and gratitude. Used properly, it is a truly beautiful prayer of the heart.

God is praised as Creator: Here are some readings from the Bible where God is praised for His work of Creation: Ps 8; 19; 24; 33; 95; 104; Pr 8.22f; Sir 42.15f; Job 38.4f; Is 40.12f).

REFLECTION:

"God's splendour covers the heavens and the earth is full of his praise," Hab 3,4

PREPARE:

Scripture: The Story of Creation (adapted from Gen 1)

In the beginning, there was no earth and no sky, no sun, no stars... nothing at all. There was nothing to look at and no-one to talk to. Then God started to make the earth and the sky. He made light first because He loves light. Little by little, God made everything... land and sea and sky. Then He made plants and birds and fish and all kinds of animals. When everything was finished, God made the first man and woman. He told them that everything was for them and that they were to look after the world that He had made.

Poster: I will respect God's work

Song: Thank you God for giving us...(flowers, birds, trees...) page 36



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children go and check the playground. Is the garden clean and tidy? Has anyone been walking on the flowers? Are there any broken trees? Has the grass been cut?

Children become aware that sometimes God's work is not respected.

Children understand that many people respect their place. They work hard to keep it looking nice.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: God Made the World (Ref Gen 1)

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

Who made the world?

Children become aware that the trees, flowers, birds etc were made by God; they are His work and should never be spoiled.

Consider: People get upset when someone spoils their work. And God, too, does not like to see His work spoiled. He wants you to look after everything He made.

Poster: I will respect God's work.

Children feel that it is important for them to respect God's work and never spoil anything.

Song: Thank you God for

Group work.
Children go and check on the playground.
Give a report on what they saw.

Draw a nice garden or use plasticine or clay to make a tree.

Children retell the story.

Children discuss the poster.

Children sing.

MICH.

Children express their appreciation of God's work and thank Him for making so many beautiful things

FOR MY LIFE: I will never spoil trees and flowers.

CHILDREN HELPING CHILDREN (1)

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

- a. become aware that there are many children in the world who do not have the things that they need
- b. be moved to help these children

BACKGROUND:

It is a strange thing that some people seem to regard children as enemies! Long ago, when the King of Egypt wanted to be rid of the people of Israel, he ordered that their babies be thrown into the Nile River. That's how he solved his problem!

Children in Bethlehem and its neighbourhood suffered and died at the time Jesus was born. This happened because of the jealousy of King Herod. Even God's Son became a refugee in the land of Egypt. His parents fled with Him by night, in order to save His life. Read Mt 2:13-23.

In the world today, many children are suffering because they are unwanted and/or lack the things they need to be healthy and happy.

REFLECTION:

What is my attitude to babies and little children?

PREPARE:

Scripture: Children are very important. Jesus wants them to have the

things they need to be healthy and happy. (Ref Mt 18:1-5)

Poster: with the words: PRAYING / GIVING. Decorate it.

Song:

- 1. God's got the whole world in His Hands (4x)
- 2. He's got mum and Dad in His hand (3x). He's got the whole world in His hand.
- 3. He's got you and me,brother, in His hand, (3x). He's got the whole world ..

LOOKING AT LIFE:

Children share: Things that I need to be happy.

They discover that they are happy when they have food, good health, a home, a school etc.

Children understand that there are many countries in the world. Some are rich and some are very poor. There are many children who do not have the things they need. Some have no food; some are sick and there is no medicine for them; some have no schools; some are afraid etc.

Children feel sorry for children who do not have what they need.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: Children are very important. Jesus wants them to have the things they need to be healthy and happy. Ref Mt 18:1-5.

DISCOVERING THE MESSAGE:

What would Jesus like all children to have? Can you remember a time when someone gave you something you needed?

Consider: It is easy for some people to send things to children in other countries and this is what Jesus wants them to do. He also wants everyone to pray for children in need.

Poster: Praying: Giving

Children realize that children are helped by prayer and by giving.

Prayer: Children express their concern for other children by singing: *God's got the whole world...*

FOR MY LIFE: I will remember that I should help children in need.

Children draw things that children need.

Teacher and children make a list: Countries we know

Children and teacher make a list: Children need

Children discuss the poster.

Children sing.

CHILDREN HELPING CHILDREN (2)

OBJECTIVES: The children will -

a. realize that Jesus wants them to help other children

b. give to the Appeal, "Children Helping Children"

BACKGROUND:

"Children's Mission" is the Catholic Church's special agency for helping children. It is one of the Pope's own Mission Societies. It was established in France in 1843. It provides financial support for the urgent needs of children in 113 countries for shelter, food, clothing, spiritual, medical, pastoral and educational care.

"Children's Mission" aims at awakening in children a desire to reach out to others in need.

The Bishops in each country appoint a Promoter and Co-ordinator for Mission effort. Children's Offerings may be sent to the Religious Education Co-ordinator in your Diocese (who would send them to the Promoter) or given to your Parish Priest.

REFLECTION:

"What good is there in your saying to the poor, "God bless you! Keep warm and eat well!" if you don't give them the necessities of life?"

James 2:16.

PREPARE:

Picture: Jesus with children, Ref Mk 10:13-16. Page 251

Money Box / Envelope for Offering: stamped, addressed

Song: God's got the whole world....



LOOKING AT LIFE:

Can you remember a time when they were asked to bring money / food to school? What was it for? Who looked after it for the children?

They realize that sometimes they help others by giving money / food.

Children feel that they would like to give something to neglected children.

LOOKING AT THE LIVING WORD:

Scripture: Jesus with Children, Mk 10:13-16 Children hear that Jesus loves children.

"Children Helping Children" (Ref Background notes)
Children become aware of a way of giving to children who are short of the things they need.

Money Box / Envelope for Offering:

Children realize that they can send money to help to buy things for children who are short of such things as food, medicine etc.

Picture: Jesus with Children

Children appreciate Jesus' love for children and realize that Jesus would like them to be good to children everywhere.

Offering: Children are helped to prepare an offering for "Children Helping Children".

Draw something these children need.

Children place the money box and envelope on the altar.

Sing: God's got the whole world...

Children talk about their offering for the next lesson

I will ask my family to help me with my offering for "Children Helping Children."
